FORD DISLIKES HIS BIRTHDAY

And Today Is Sixty-second Anniversary

Multi-millionaire Admits He Doesn't Like Golf, But Does Enjoy Dancing

DETROIT, Mich., July 30.—Henry Ford's pet antipathies are New Years and birthdays.

So today, as he quietly celebrated the 62nd anniversary of his coming into the world, he was disinclined to make any particular comment on business, success, how to stay young at 62, or other stock subjects.

"Never felt better in my life," he declared in answer to inquiry of the United Press. "I'm living in today, tomorrow will take care of itself and yesterday is taken care of. See no reason for any statement."

His birthday found Ford apparently as vigorous, healthy and ambitious as in the days of his youth and interested in the relatively unimportant things as well as the important things of life.

Ford does not attribute his splendid physical condition to golf. While his son Edsel is considered rather proficient as a golfer, Ford himself never has taken up the game. He keeps in trim by taking brisk walks in early morning, chopping wood and doing farm chores. He never has put himself on a diet. He eats moderately but what and when he pleases.

One of the favorite recreations of the multi-millionaire is dancing. His friends consider him a graceful dancer.

Modern jazz dancing does not, however, meet with Ford's favor. He much prefers the old time polka, quadrille and waltz. Some time ago he engaged two noted masters of the old fashioned dances to teach him and his wife.

Carrying this idea further, Ford began holding dances three times a week at the Ford laboratory for his executives. Three hundred of these officials are now learning the old time dances.

Belief that the jazz age was the result of an outburst of abnormal emotion led Ford to attempt a rejuvenation of the all but forgotten dances of old.

He points to the fact that no particular dance of the jazz type had lived long, while the old time steps had come down through the ages and would continue to exist long after jazz was but a memory.

CHINESE SOLDIERS TO SEEK AMERICAN

Bandits Demand Ransom In Exchange for Dr. Howard

PEKIN, July 30.—The Chinese government has sent 1,000 men to the region of the Morgan Palmer ranch in Manchuria in an attempt to release Dr. Harvey Howard, American, from the bandits who kidnaped him last week.

Howard, associated with the Rockefeller foundation's hospital in Pekin,

was kidnaped and secreted by bandits who raided the Palmer ranch and killed Palmer last week.

The sending of the troops followed American consular and diplomatic reports on the incident to the Chinese authorities.

That Howard still lives is indicated by reports reaching here that the bandits now are demanding ransom for his life. The American legation understands that they desire money and bullets, though there has been no direct communication and official efforts to learn the bandits' terms have been fruitless.
