**PESSIMISM BANISHED**

Pessimistically we reported here some weeks ago that it then seemed apparent that the fond hope that The Dalles-California highway would be completed in 1926 seemed impossible of realization. At that time it was certain that every section of the road would be finished except a 10 mile stretch south of Crescent. This, it seemed foredoomed, would not be graded until next year nor surfaced until 1927. Now the prospect has changed and it is as certain as anything merely human can be that the road will be finished from The Dalles on the north to Klamath Falls on the south by the end of next year.

Contracts now under way or recently let cover the remaining surfacing between Maupin and Cow canyon, the Crooked river bridge, surfacing from Lava butte to La Pine, grading from the Deschutes county line to Crescent, grading and surfacing the Corral springs section and surfacing the Beaver marsh section. It is ordered that contracts be let to grade from Bend to Lava butte and from Crescent to the Corral springs section. When these are done—and they are to be done this year—there will remain only the grading and surfacing of the approaches to the Crooked river bridge, the surfacing of the Bend-Lava butte section, of the section from La Pine to Crescent and that from Crescent to the Corral springs section. There are four items only and they are now in line to be completed in 1926 without fail.

In place of the pessimism of a few weeks ago there is reason now for high optimism. The highway is soon to be finished. Twelve months from this date should see it all done and we can invite the world to come here on a remarkably fine macadamized highway.

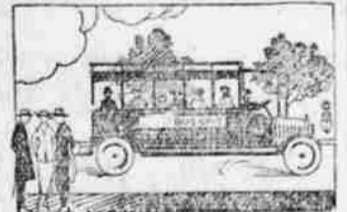
**Motor Patrol Planned For American Borders**

WASHINGTON, July 31.—A small army of motorized agents will patrol the United States borders to prevent liquor smuggling when the reorganized prohibition plan of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews goes into effect. The now unguarded Canadian border from Washington to North Dakota, will have day and night vigiliantes to halt booze transportation and at the same time stop smuggling of wheat and cattle across the line. Dry agents, under the decentralized scheme will work with customs collectors and aid the government in gathering duty on merchandise that now slips over the borders along unguarded stretches.

**Excellent Work Done At Epworth Institute**

With more than 100 registered, work is progressing smoothly and rapidly at the annual Suttle Lake Epworth League Institute, reports J. O. Gibson, who is spending the week at the lake. A well mapped out course of study for the mornings, afternoons devoted to relaxation and organized play, and evenings to the daily sermon, form an outline of the week's work. The institute will continue through Sunday. Eighty-three are registered in the mess club, which hires two permanent cooks, and drafts a new crew of kitchen police daily. In addition to the mess club there are a number of family groups.
