**Man-made Lightning May Dictate Peace**

for this test, but I am going into this knowing what I am doing.

"People generally believe that Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz's 'thunder and lightning' machine was destroyed because of its terrific power. They're wrong. I got the original parts and the plans. My 'death stroke' though is improved and I confidently believe will deal death and destruction at a range of 20 miles. It will make war impossible.

"My apparatus probably will be housed within a base 25 by 30 feet with a superstructure 15 to 20 feet in height. It will weigh over five tons. It is not a toy. Other experimenters have made lightning bolts six feet in length, using a million volts. Judge of the power of the 'death stroke,' projected 20 miles.

Dr. Scott admits he wants to sell his invention to the government for "a lot of money."

"I have no relatives and I can't take it away with me. I want the money to help people who are counting on me for help. I want to do some good for the worthy, as well as aid in preventing future wars," he said. "My parents were born in Ireland but I am an American—100 per cent, and no foreign power is going to have this. The British air ministry deposited \$25,000 one in the Riggs National bank to secure a test but I turned it down."

**RANGER SLAYER GOES TO DEATH**

**Charles Craig Is Hanged at San Quentin**

**Bible Gives Doomed Man Strength to Go Through With Final Ordeal**

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)  
 SAN QUENTIN, Cal., July 31.—Charles Craig, 22, was hanged here today for the murder of Sam Hermansen, forest ranger, July 10, 1924. Craig marched bravely to his death, mounting the gallows at 10 a. m. sharp. One minute later the trap was sprung. Prison physicians pronounced him dead 12 minutes later.

Craig was accompanied on his death march by Rev. W. H. Bundy of Oakland, who had given him solace during his last days. The condemned man said nothing on the gallows and did not look at the 25 spectators below him.

Earlier in the day the youth told Rev. Bundy and Rev. S. P. Pope of Red Bluff that he did not fear death. "I have read the Bible and am ready to die. I am convinced that some day I will return to the earth in another form."

Craig left two telegrams, one to his mother, Mrs. E. E. Craig of Kansas City, and the other to his wife. They read:

"Be of good cheer. Live with thy God. Love."

Craig and Jack Baker were convicted of slaying Hermansen, who attempted to stop them after they had robbed a Red Bluff, California, bank. Baker pleaded guilty and was given a life sentence. Craig was sentenced to hang. His conviction was held by one appeal.
