STOCKS HEAVY ON EXCHANGE

Temporary Overbuying Is Evidenced

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 31.—Stocks were generally heavy today. Evidently the list had reached a point where it was temporarily overbought. While attacking pivotal issues like United States Steel, American Can, Mack Truck and General Motors, professional operators succeeded in dislodging considerable liquidation in White Motors, Ward Baking "B," Fisher Body, Famous Players, United States Rubber, Industrial Alcohol, Montgomery Ward, American & Foreign Power and various other leaders of the recent demonstration on the side of rising prices.

Call money advanced to 4 1/2 per cent in the late afternoon, compared with the renewal rate of 4 per cent and yesterday's low of 3 3/4 per cent. On the surface the tightening of money was surprising in view of the 2 per cent gain over the preceding week scored by the reserve ratio of the local Federal Reserve bank. But this increase was accounted for by the transfer to this center of \$21,000,000 gold from other districts through the gold settlement fund with the Federal Reserve board at Washington.

Text Book Commission Meeting Will be Held

PORT ANGELES, Wash., July 31.—The state text book commission is being called by Governor Pierce for Monday morning to consider measures for meeting the situation with which the schools of the state are confronted through the expiration of the contracts on text books in use during the past six years and the refusal of the publishers to renew the contracts at the old price.
At the last session of the legislature an attempt was made to vest the state superintendent of public instruction with authority to enter into a "gentlemen's agreement" with the text book publishers for the purchase of the necessary books for the next two years or until a satisfactory contract could be agreed upon.
Such a bill was passed by the legislature but was vetoed by Governor Pierce on the ground that it was merely playing into the hands of the publishers.

Picnic Party Poison Plot Laid Bare Just in Time

HEALDSBURG, CAL., July 31.—What appears to have been a plot to poison a picnic party was investigated here today, with one arrest probable, authorities said.
Mr. and Mrs. N. E. Holpin and family and Postmaster and Mrs. George Pearson spent Sunday at Wright's beach. Some one in the party noticed a white powder sprinkled over part of the lunch. The food was not eaten.
Upon returning home, Holpin gave some of the lunch to the family cat and the animal promptly died.
Archie Hewitt, Santa Rosa chemist, pronounced the powder strychnine.
