**United States Troops Now Being Withdrawn**

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—President Coolidge's policy of withdrawing as rapidly as possible, American troops from foreign countries will become effective in Nicaragua tomorrow when the 120 United States marines there embark for home.

After 13 years' service, the marine contingent, which has acted as a so-called legation guard at Managua, will report to Secretary of the Navy Willbur aboard the U. S. S. Henderson at Corinto and leave behind the troubled affairs of Nicaragua.

This action follows similar withdrawal from the Dominican republic earlier in the year.

President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg hope to complete the policy by withdrawing the United States marines from Haiti as soon as conditions there warrant.

Though the state department has declined to set a date for termination of American occupation of Haiti, it is understood that part of those troops will be withdrawn before next spring.

**Bend Area Relief Map Still Draws Attention**

The relief map of Bend and the surrounding country which was shown in the lobby of the Imperial hotel at the time of the Elks convention, and ever since, will remain there for another month if the Bend lodge will permit Phil Metschan, hotel manager to continue to display it.

The lodge had written stating that the map might now be returned, but in reply T. H. Foley, exalted ruler, has received a note from Metschan stating that the hotel would be quite willing to keep it for another month as it continues to attract much attention, and that if it is retained it will be draped to conform to the color scheme of new decorations of the hotel.

PRINEVILLE, Aug. 3.—City water in Prineville is free from bacteria diseases. It was learned Saturday by local officials at the offices of the Deschutes Power Co., who received the water report from the Oregon state board of health in answer to samples of water taken from farthest ends in wells in different sections of the city. The bacteriological analysis shows the water to be in "A" condition.

Collections were made by E. A. Smith, newly appointed general superintendent of the Deschutes Power Co. One sample of water was taken from the Home hospital, where water runs the farthest west of town.
