STOCKS STRONG AS WEEK OPENS

Profit Taking Is Readily Absorbed by Market

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Stocks were stimulated at the beginning of the week by extraordinary demand demonstrations of strength in a number of higher priced issues. Aggressive operations for the rise in General Electric and American Can created manifest nervousness among the shorts and furnished good background for sensational uprushes in stocks like General Railway signal, Westinghouse Air Brake and other specialties with a thin market.

Steel common was in active demand at the best levels of the present forward movement. The outstanding feature of the day was the ease with which profit taking in General Electric and American Can was absorbed in checking the upward trend of these stocks. The performance furnished rather conclusive evidence that a large amount of surplus money was still seeking employment in well established issues with prospects of increased dividends or stock distribution.

U. S. PRESIDENT ON THIRD YEAR

Increasing Popularity Becomes Evident

Coolidge Seen As Actual Leader of Republican Party Since Election

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., Aug. 3.—Calvin Coolidge today entered his third year as president of the United States, apparently on the crest of a rising wave of popularity unequalled, his friends say, since the era of "good feeling" in the unopposed administration of President Monroe a century ago.

Two years ago, in the early hours of the morning, President Coolidge was sworn in by his father, as president, in his father's home in the Vermont hills. President Harding had died suddenly in San Francisco a few hours earlier and Vice President Coolidge emerging from obscurity rose to one of the most powerful positions in the world.

His friends say that in his two years as president Coolidge has captured the imagination and support of the American people as no president has done since Lincoln. His watchword has been "peace and prosperity." The slogan upon which he ran for reelection was "keep cool with Coolidge." His success probably can be gauged best by his landslide victory last fall.

Coolidge has become the actual leader of the republican party since he became president. His friend and campaign manager, William Butler, is chairman of the party.

Today the man who presided Butler, Frank T. Adams of Iowa, called at the summer White House where the president is spending a two months' vacation. The visit was generally taken as an indicator of a new harmony within republican ranks and possibly as a victory for the Coolidge policy seeking to bring the United States into the world court. Coolidge has made the world court adherence a leading feature of his administration.

ECLIPSE OF MOON IS DUE TOMORROW

But Only Early Risers Will See Partial Dimming

Persons who are abroad sufficiently early tomorrow morning, just before the sun mounts into the sky from behind the distant Ochoco mountains, will see part of the full moon, dipping toward the Cascade range in the west, blotted out by the earth's shadow.

Tomorrow morning's eclipse is referred to by astronomers as a partial eclipse, the earth's shadow racing over only a portion of the disc of the moon. People in Bend and Central Oregon will witness only the beginning of the obscuration, since the moon will dip behind the western mountains and over the Pacific ocean before the shadow moves very far over the surface of the satellite.

When it enters the shadow of the earth tomorrow morning, the moon will be in the constellation Capricornus, below and south of the two great twin stars, Castor and Pollux. The moon will set shortly after sunrise. Since an eclipse of the moon can only occur when the earth's satellite is at its full phase, the moon will be full tomorrow morning.

The eclipse of tomorrow morning will be the final one of the year. The annular eclipse of the sun on July 20-21 was not visible on the American continent. The beginning of the eclipse of the morning of August 4 will be visible generally over all of western America.
