

New York Boxing Commission Doesn't Know Dempsey

CHAMPION "OUT" VISITORS TOLD

Begs for Fight With Wills for Next Year

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The New York state boxing commission announced this afternoon that it is "through" with Jack Dempsey and will ignore the heavyweight champion in the future.

Hope was expressed that organized boxing bodies in other states would cooperate with the New York action in this respect.

Dempsey has no chance in this state, so we cannot make him fight," Chairman James A. Farley announced. "Accordingly, we will ignore him in the future."

"We have no authority to vacate the heavyweight title nor to name another champion, however," said Farley.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, looked himself behind closed doors with his advisers today as soon as he learned that the New York boxing commission had decided to treat him with official indifference.

"Mr. Dempsey is out," the champion's newly appointed "private secretary" and press agent announced. "He'll have a statement to make later in the day. Nothing right now."

Five minutes earlier Dempsey and his "yes man" entered a hotel room for conference and presumably were still in session when the "secretary" announced he was unable to communicate with his employer.

Dempsey, according to his cronies, is disappointed that the boxing commission has refused to recognize him and take an official hand in arranging a fight with Harry Wills.

Other Promoters Got Chance
Jimmy De Forest, Floyd Fitzsimmons and a dozen other fight promoters have kept in the champion's shadow for a week, dogging him for a match. They have all been given the cold shoulder, pending action of the New York ring commissioners.

Dempsey has written and aired in humble tones to the eastern ring gongs, literally begging for a Wills match next summer and assuring the commissioners he was not interested in fighting anyone but the colored challenger.

Now that the commissioners have placed the champion on their "black list" it is not probable he will talk business with some of the promoters who have journeyed here to arrange matches.

In any event, Dempsey will not step into a ring with Harry Wills or any other fighter of the negro's caliber before next summer. The champion admits he would be unable to set in fighting form before that time.

Heavyweight Champion To Wait on Commission

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, will not sign for any fights until he has heard from the New York boxing commission regarding the details of the Harry Wills match, he made known today.

Dempsey has turned down the proposed fight with Harry Grob in September, temporarily at least. The champion discussed the match with Floyd Fitzsimmons, Chicago promoter, but has withheld any decision pending word from the New York boxing commission.

In a letter to the New York commissioners the champion indicated he would meet Wills without any "preliminary fights" if they desired.

MATCH EARL SMITH FOR NEXT SMOKER

Earl Smith Placed on Card Against Clever Boxer

Battling Earl Smith has been matched to appear in the semi final of the bricklayers' fight, card on the night of August 10 against Earl Stolz of Bend, according to an announcement made today by O. R. Montgomery, matchmaker.

Stolz's opponent on the original card, with Submarine Dean and Spee Woods as the headliners, was Eddie Clark, but just recently Montgomery received a wire from Clark, who is in Washington, asking that his appearance on the card be cancelled. Smith was coming to Bend to challenge the winner of the Dean-Woods bout, and arrangements were made for the Spokane fighter to meet Stolz.

Although not the headliners, it is predicted that the Stolz-Smith battle will provide some real amusement for the Bend fans. In his last three appearances in the ring, Smith has chalked up two knockouts and one draw. The two knockouts were with Sailor Boyce. In his most recent, Smith, who will enter the ring at 145, fought a draw with Edie Wyle.

Woods' Dean's opponent on the night of August 10, is in Portland working out with Danny Edwards, hard hitting colored fighter. Woods plans to come to Bend from Portland on August 7. He will take several workouts locally before stepping into the ring to face Dean. Dean and Woods will fight at 145.

The curtain raiser of the bricklayers' card will be a four round go between Frenchie Gaspard and Cowboy Baxter. The main event will be a 10 round fight, and the Smith-Stolz affair will be a six round battle.

Boxers Do Not Appear When Commission Calls

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—Jack Dempsey and Mickey Walker were again on the court calendar of the New York boxing commission today and again they did not appear.

Dempsey is in California getting over his fight with Jack Kearns, and Walker is in Chicago with Kearns, getting ready for his fight with Billy Wells.

Dempsey has asked the commissioners for a stay of execution, but Walker apparently has twiddled his fingers at them.

If the commission wants to be severe with Walker, it can.

He is licensed as the world's welterweight champion in New York and he also has a \$10,000 bond posted with the commission and a promise that he will accept Shade's challenge before August 15.

The commission can suspend Walker and forfeit the \$10,000 bond to Shade, but, from his recent actions, people's expense.

A clean decision went to Warren. Marcus failed to win a single round of the fight and only the fifth was even. In another eight round main event George Ingessoll, Astoria welterweight, knocked out Pat Coghlin of Longview in the third round. Billy Welch of Astoria and Scott Holliday, deaf and dumb negro of Portland, fought a six round draw. Eddie Tracey of Portland took a technical knockout victory over Finn Boyson of Astoria when R. E. Gorman, referee, stopped the fight in the third round.

Shade Is Drawn Fine For Saturday Battle

FRENCH SWIMMER BATTLING CHANNEL

Last Sighted at Night Four Miles From Dover

DOVER, England, Aug. 4.—Mme. Jeanne Sion, French woman swimmer who started on a cross channel swim from Cape Gris Nez to Dover this morning, appeared to be five miles from Dover at 5:45 p. m.

At 10 p. m. Mme. Sion was about four miles off Dover. At that hour a thick mist suddenly came up and it was impossible to see the tug which was escorting her.

CAPE GRIS NEZ, France, Aug. 4.—Mme. Jeanne Sion, plucky French woman swimmer, who plunged into the English channel today, defying disadvantageous weather conditions in an attempt to be the first woman to swim across, had progressed 12 miles from Cape Gris Nez towards Dover late this afternoon and was believed to have a good chance of succeeding.

Hopeful of snatching from her American and Argentine rivals, the honor of being the first woman to swim the English channel, Mme. Sion began the attempt at 8:10 a. m. Weather conditions were far from favorable, a strong southwest wind having made the water in mid channel rough, but with Gertrude Ederle, American champion, and Lillian Harrison, of Argentine, ready to start at the first opportunity, Mme. Sion decided to take the long chance.

The French woman's quest at first

was considered practically hopeless, the wind having shifted to the west, an unfavorable quarter.
Miss Harrison was aboard the tug which accompanied her rival, while Miss Ederle watched the departure from the shore.

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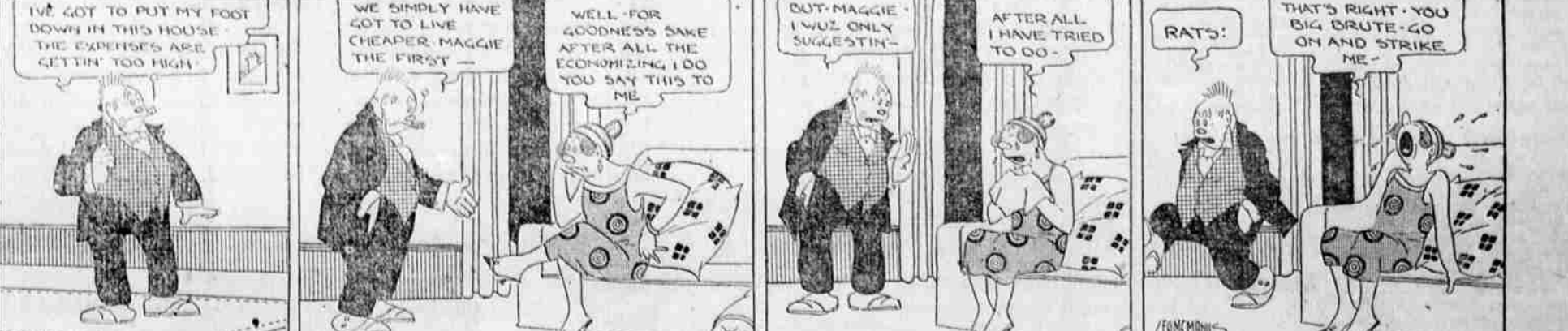
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
