Rev. Ferris left Tuesday evening for Portland, where in his official work as state convention pastor he has in charge the University Park Baptist church.

Scientist Recommends Pie For Daily Bread

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—Science upset the precepts of physicians today by recommending three pieces of pie as part of the daily food ration of every one.

"Pie is not indigestible, as claimed, but help to form a balanced diet," Dr. H. E. Barnard, of the American Institute of Baking, told the American Chemical society meeting here.

"I have made laboratory tests during the past year, and have concluded that we ought to return to the old fashioned menus of our mothers and eat a piece of pie at the end of every meal."

WOODS FIRE PERIL BECOMING GREATER

All Available Men In Everett Vicinity Drafted

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 5.—The forest fire situation on the Pacific slope of Washington had this morning reached its most alarming proportions of the year.

"The situation is the worst I have ever seen," said Fire Warden J. W. Bigby today.

At Everett, Fire Garden George Richards is drafting all men available in pool halls, streets and hotels to fight the serious fires in that section.

The Silver Lake fire swept up from a point south of the lake, where it jumped the highway and swept through second growth timber, shutting off automobile traffic for a time on the Pacific highway.

North of Everett a 14 mile wall of flames borders the highway on both sides from Marysville to Sylvanna. The Seattle light transmission lines from its Skagit plant are menaced by the blaze.

The biggest and most serious fire of the day is sweeping southward from the Stevens-Bird Logging Company near High Rock, where the plant of the company is threatened.

MRSOULA, Mont., Aug. 5.—Scores of forest fires were raging out of control today in the forest reserve district comprising Western Montana, Northern Idaho and Eastern Washington.

A check by foresters showed that 475 fires were burning in the area and it was estimated that 17,620 acres have already been burned over in the district.

Heavy winds yesterday scattered fires beyond control in the Kanibus, Clearwater, St. Joe and Coeur d'Alene forests in Idaho and Montana.

The Bernard creek fire in the Clearwater district has spread over an area of 2,500 acres on Scurry mountain. Southwest of Wallace, Idaho, two fires are burning on more than a mile front.

All available men have been sent to fight the flames.

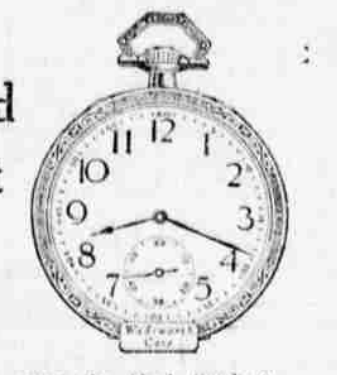
