STANDARD RAIL STOCKS LIKED

Investors Turn From Industrial Issues

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Interests sponsoring the current bullish activities in the stock market showed a disposition today to turn away from the recent industrial leaders to the standard investment rails and investment public utilities favorites, especially Montana Power and Public Service Corporation of New Jersey.

After a buoyant opening, featured by new highs in American Can, General Motors, United States Steel and other pivotal issues, trading was diverted on a gradually increasing scale into high grade rails. Industrials closed lower.

No dissatisfaction was expressed by the people accepting profits with regard to the extent of the seasonal pickup in business conditions and the outlook for the autumn months. Both of these factors were looked upon as highly gratifying, but interests responsible for the principal realizing sales were inclined to believe that the recent brisk advance had gone a long way toward discounting the general improvement.

ETHYL FLUID USED IN CARS

Scientists Discuss New Motor Type

May Revolutionize Automobile Industry, Predicted at Chemists Meeting

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—A motor that may revolutionize the automobile industry has been developed by United States army engineers. It was revealed today at the convention of the American Chemical society.

The engine, driven by ethyl fluid, will double the mileage of automobiles, it is claimed, and increase by approximately 28 per cent the relative horsepower of motor driven vehicles.

It was devised at Camp Holabird, Maryland, under direction of Arthur W. Harrington, army engineer, and has been thoroughly tested out in army trucks and proven practicable, it was said.

The new motor requires gasoline treated with ethyl fluid containing tetraethyl lead, instead of standard fuel. Its adoption generally by automobile users depends, according to the scientists meeting here, on the success of the synthetic motor fuel, now under federal investigation.

"If the specially treated gas can be brought with safety into general use, it will revolutionize the automobile industry," declared Harrington in describing his invention.

"It will mean not only a tremendous saving in fuel, but will result in amazing increase in horsepower."

The new motor, according to Harrington, would be costly if rebuilt from parts intended for the standard motor, but the additional cost would be relatively inexpensive if the engine were built to proper specifications at the factory.

"The increased cost would be more than offset by the tremendous saving in fuel and power," he said.

Harrington's colleagues, attending the 70th annual convention here, applauded the engineering feat and were practically unanimous in endorsing the practicability of the motor.

The ban on chemical warfare adopted at the Geneva conference was denounced by the delegates in formal resolutions as a menace to humanity and national defense. The taboo on gas warfare threatens scientific research in behalf of national safety, the chemists contended.

The next annual spring meeting of the society will be held at Tulsa, Oklahoma, in 1926. The 1927 spring gathering will be at Richmond, Virginia, and the fall meeting of 1927 at Detroit.

The semi-centennial celebration of the society will be in Philadelphia during the week of September 6, 1926.

There will never be a gas famine and the price of gasoline or a satisfactory synthetic substitute should never exceed 25 cents per gallon, according to a startling scientific symposium here today incident to the convention.

In a series of brilliant and informative papers read before the division of industrial engineering chemistry, the gas famine scare was given a cool and scientific airing, and openly ridiculed by a group of distinguished chemists.

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HURRICANE RAGES THROUGH THE ALPS

Mountaineers Hurlled Into Abyss by Winds

TURIN, Aug. 5.—A hurricane raged through the Alps today, tearing up houses and trees and endangering the lives of dwellers among the peaks.

From Monte Rosa came word that two Alpine climbers had been swept away by the swirling force of the storm. One of them was blown down into an abyss, while the other, for a fleeting moment, clung in safety to a rope above the giant chasm. Then a stronger blast swept him, too, down into the depths.

Another tale of tragedy came in from Ivrea, relating the fate which had befallen Monte Berone, 7,500 feet above sea level. The villagers were celebrating the feast of the Redeemer when the hurricane roared in from the mountains, knocking down houses and tearing up trees.

In its path, the wind seized a woman, dashing her as though she were no more than a blade of straw, down into the abyss below.

From Bolzano on the border of the Tyrol came the report that customs warehouses had been burned with an enormous damage.

Council of Ambassadors Orders Cities Evacuated

PARIS, Aug. 5.—The council of ambassadors today instructed the allied military committee to execute the evacuation of Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhrort, occupied independently of the Ruhr by the allies in March, 1921.

The occupation of these three important German towns followed the refusal of the then German foreign minister, Simons, to accept the reparations terms laid down by the London conference of 1921.
