

HUNT SCHWARTZ ON BOARD SHIP

Steamer Nordic to Stop at Westport

Man Answering to Description of Murder Suspect On Way to Sweden

 PORTLAND, Aug. 6.—The Swedish steamer Nordic, en route from San Francisco, is due at Westport, Oregon, tomorrow afternoon and will dock there before coming to Portland.

Authorities will search the vessel there for a man suspected of being Charles Henry Schwartz, missing Walnut Creek scientist.

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 6.—Charles Henry Schwartz, missing Oakland chemist who is wanted for murder, is believed to have escaped aboard the steamer Nordic of the General Steamship company, which left here yesterday for Swedish ports.

Officials of the Moore shipyard here told Chief of Police Drew today that the day after the explosion and fire in the Walnut Creek laboratory, a man answering Schwartz's description, carrying two suit cases and highly nervous, asked directions to the Nordic's dock.

After leaving her pier here, the Nordic lay in the bay until yesterday. Wireless communication with the vessel will be made in an effort to bring about the apprehension of Schwartz, if the man aboard is proven to be the man being hunted in the "insurance hoax murder."

FATE OF SCOTT LEFT TO JURY

Early Decision Expected as to Sanity

No Compromise Verdict as to Killer to be Permitted, Court Rules

 COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—The jurors who are to decide whether Russell Scott is insane and thereby save him from hanging or that he is sane and must go to the gallows started their deliberations at 4:25 today. Judge Joseph B. David, in instructing the jury warned that Scott must be presumed sane until preponderant evidence of insanity is found.

The jury must consider the capability of the various witnesses called to give their opinion of Scott's mental condition, he said.

The defense considered this point a victory. The jury had no choice of verdict, the court said.

It must be sane or insane as the mental condition of the prisoner is the only question involved, said the judge.

Scott showed a real interest for the first time during the reading of instructions. He sat up straight and paid close attention to Judge David.

In his instructions, Judge David ordered the jury to remember that the burden of proof rests with the petitioner, Scott being considered sane until otherwise decided.

As to the verdict, the judge told the jury they must either find him sane or insane and have no other verdict to bring in.

Russell was taken out to the bullpen. His parents and wife remained in the court room. The elder Scott sat alone and his wife and Mrs. Russell Scott sat together, some distance away. They eyed the door to the jury room nervously, twisting their hands and crumpling their handkerchiefs.

From records taken over a number of years at 3,000 stations, together with observations made on board ship it is calculated that on an average there are 16 thunderstorms over every 260 square miles of the earth's surface annually. 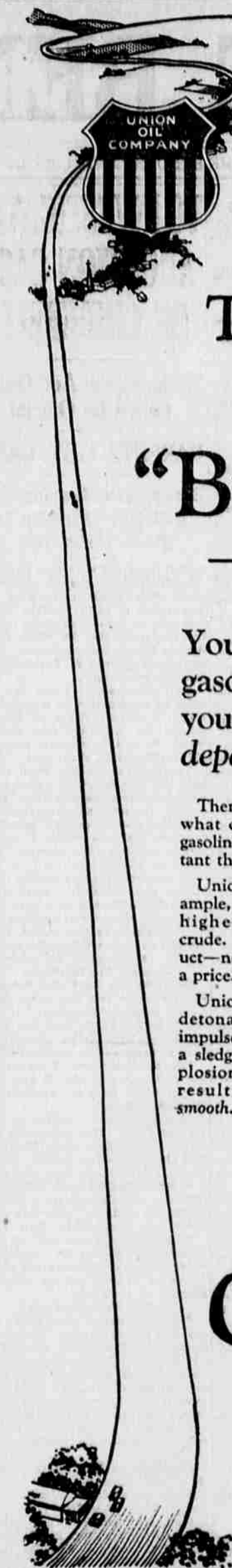
