### Cobb Plans Housecleaning for Next Year

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Clubs of the National League and Philadelphia for the next world's series is the choice of the Detroit players who are now in town with Ty Cobb for a series with the New York Yankees.

The game of the Athletics for the American league championship is no great surprise, but two weeks ago any ball player picking the Reds for the National league pennant would have been viewed suspiciously.

In the last two weeks, however, the Reds have made such a sprint and the Pirates and the Giants have slumped so much that competent critics have been looking at the club as a dark horse possibility.

The Tiger players admit that they have not seen much of the National league teams this year, but they favor the Reds on account of the fine pitching staff and the general breaks.

The Giants have been broken up all season with injuries and they will have to finish the season with a patched infield. Eddie Farrell, a boy just out of Pennsylvania university, is at shortstop. No club, they point out, has ever won a pennant without a high class, seasoned shortstop.

The Tigers favor the Athletics against the champion Senators because of their youth and hustle. This opinion is against the expert belief and the theory of the Washington management that veteran players will be able to stand the gaff of the drive through the stretch better than Connie Mack's club of kids.

Ty Cobb has not much to say about his team this year. He is looking to the future and making plans for next year. Cobb has let it be known that he is going to do a general house cleaning this fall and that Manush is the only player on the club who is sure of his job.

## TWO START FRIDAY ON CHANNEL SWIM

### Gertrude Ederle Confident of Ability to Set Record

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) CAPE GRIS NEZ, France, Aug. 6.—Gertrude Ederle, American swimmer, will start with Lillian Harrison, Argentine swimmer, in an attempt to swim the channel at 6:20 tomorrow evening, trainers announced today.

Miss Ederle had been scheduled to start on Saturday. This will be the second attempt of Miss Harrison within a month to master the channel. On her first attempt she was forced to give up when five miles from Dover.

The girl who had clipped 5 1/2 minutes from the record for the swim from the battery, New York, to Sandy Hook, was thoroughly optimistic that she would be able to hang up the record of being the first woman to negotiate the channel successfully.

### Would Like Chance at Fred Gilbert Afterward

Eager to get another match with Fred Gilbert if Submarine Dean can be laid away Monday night when the bricklayers present their 20 round fight card, Spec Woods arrived in Bend this morning from Portland, where he has been working out with Dagny Edwards, victor over Tommy O'Brien last week.

Woods recalled this morning shortly after his arrival in Bend that it will be four years ago next fall that he met Gilbert in a local ring, on Labor day. In this fight, Woods, who is in excellent shape at present, disposed of the Bend man in the sixth round of a 10 round go. Whether this performance can be repeated is problematical, nevertheless Woods will challenge Gilbert if he can get by Dean.

Referring to Dean, Woods is not so cock sure that he can get the vocal fighter's measure. The Portland man is acquainted with Dean's record, and is of the opinion that Dean has been under estimated locally. When Dean breezed into Bend from Wallace, Idaho, several months ago, he was in poor physical condition, but nevertheless he got a draw from Gilbert at the Elks' smoker. On the eve of July 4 Dean went eight rounds to a draw with the hard hitting Earl Stolze. He has been training consistently for his fight with Woods.

Spec will start his workouts this evening at 6:30 in the old K. of C. hall. Dean, Stolze and Earl Smith, Stolze's opponent in the coming fight, will also work out every evening. An invitation has been extended to fight fans to drop in and see the boys in action.

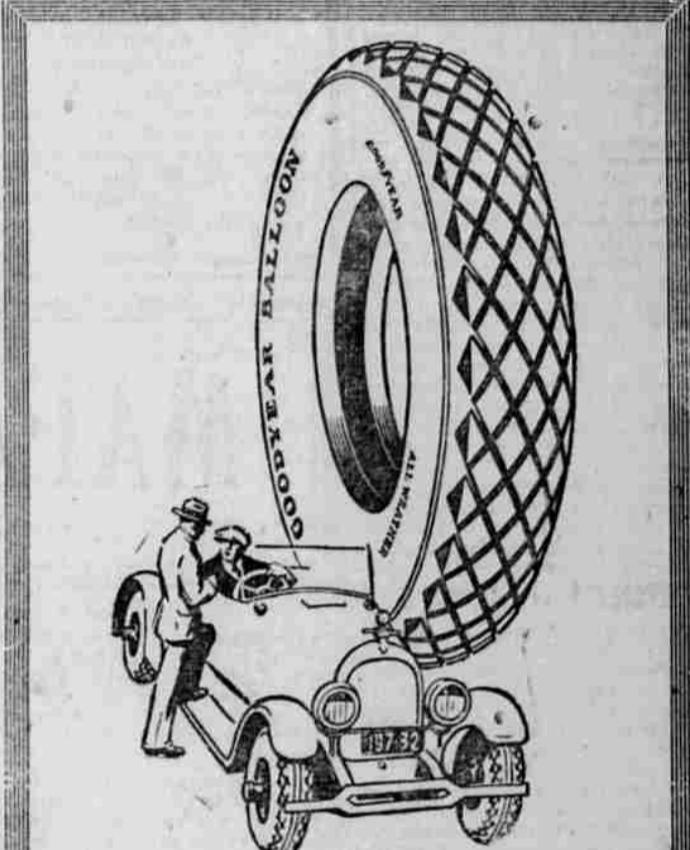
