JULY'S HEAT RUNS LESS THAN USUAL

Maximum for Month Just Past Only 93 Degrees

Although July was characterized by a number of warm days, the high range of temperature common in this month in former years was absent this year, it is shown in the weather data for the past month as compiled by the cooperative government observer in Bend. The highest temperature recorded in July this year was 93 degrees. In like months of former years, a temperature of 100 degrees was reached on at least one day in the month.

The total precipitation for the month was .59 of an inch, all of this accompanying the thunderstorms of July 23, 24 and 25. Twenty-seven of the 31 days in the past month were clear. The Central Oregon sky was not overcast for an entire day in July.

Warm nights on several occasions marked July, 1925. It is shown by the government weather records. For several nights the temperature ranged above 60 degrees. The minimum temperature was 33 degrees, on July 2.

Washington

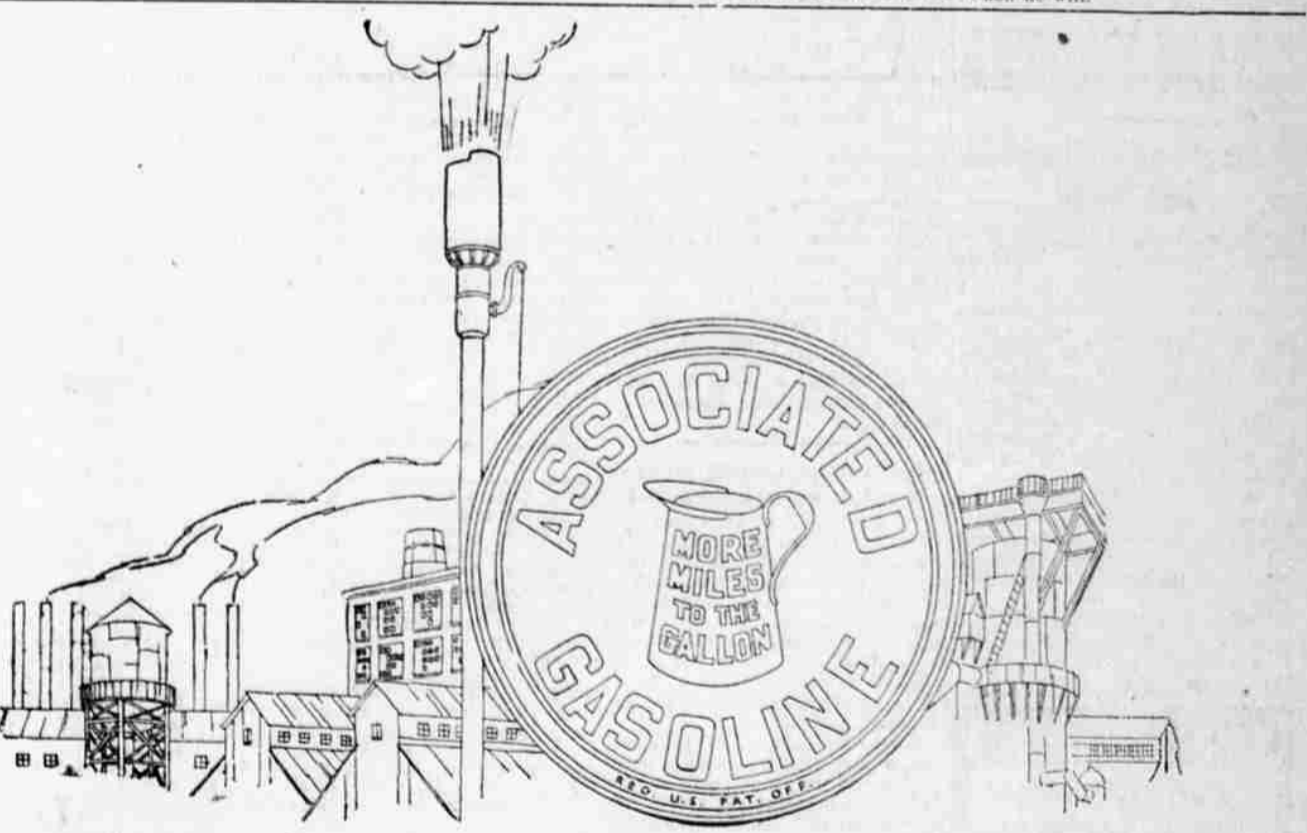

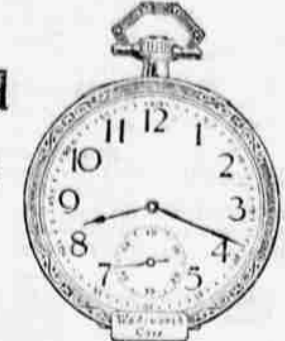
