More than 55 persons saw the workouts in the old K. of C. hall last night, indicating that the interest in the coming fight is even in local business circles. Stokoe and Woods will start their final workout Sunday afternoon at about 2:30, and other fighters on the card will put on the gloves for their final round of training later in the afternoon.

Frenchmen Break Record For Long Time of Flight
