"The president, therefore, is hopeful that the industry will find its solution in the present situation," Hoover said. The president and Hoover believe there is still a chance for the operators and miners to avert the strike and do not propose that government interference shall complicate the question.

Realignment of the Klan May Be Result of Meeting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—A political and sectional realignment of the Ku Klux Klan was believed to be foreshadowed by the huge gathering of klansmen, totaling probably about 85,000, here today, for a gigantic parade down Pennsylvania avenue. According to authoritative reports, the convention here today is a gesture of northern klansmen toward wresting control of the organization from the south, by which it has been dominated since its inception.

ALLEGED KILLER NOT ON VESSEL

Fire Victim In Laboratory Identified

Officials Convinced Chemical Explosion Part of Insurance Plot

ASTORIA, Aug. 8.—The Swedish steamer Nordic was being searched this afternoon by authorities in an effort to locate Charles Henry Schwartz, missing Walnut Creek chemist.

Oakland authorities were informed that a man answering his description was seen boarding the vessel in that city. Schwartz is sought for the alleged murder of G. W. Barbe in an insurance hoax.

The Nordic arrived at anchor in the Columbia river at 2 p. m.

MARTINEZ, Cal., Aug. 8.—With the body of the man left in the Pacific cellulose laboratory at Walnut Creek established as that of G. W. Barbe, authorities today turned to the search for Charles Henry Schwartz, chemist, wanted for murder.

Schwartz, genius of the artificial silk factory that in two years had never made a thread of silk, did not escape on the steamer Nordic. Radio communication with the vessel, approaching Seattle, established that no such person was aboard.

Identification of the body found in the bent-swept laboratory was made by Cecil A. Barker, Placerville undertaker, who viewed the body in the San Francisco morgue.

Satisfied that Barbe, said by Barker to be the son of Rev. John H. Barbe, 195 Locust street, Jersey Shore, Pa., had been murdered and the body left as part of an insurance hoax by which beneficiaries of Schwartz would receive \$180,000, Sheriff R. R. Veale turned to remaining clues in the search for the missing chemist.

"The plot failed because the fire in the laboratory did not burn as long as apparently was counted on," the sheriff said. "In another 10 minutes the blaze would have so marred the body as to make identification other than Schwartz, as unlikely. There would have been no suspicion, no investigation and no exposition of another 'perfect crime' gone wrong."

300 More Men Needed On Mount Baker Fire

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Aug. 8.—Efforts were being made today to find 300 additional men to fight fires spreading in the Mount Baker region. The Bacon Creek fire in green timber, covering 200 acres, was out of control with 25 men doing work without avail to bring it under control. In Hannegan pass, a fire was running wild over about 300 acres. Approximately 100 men were concentrated at this blaze.

Additional fire fighters were attempting to stem the Silicia creek fire, burning on a mile and a half front.
