FRENCH TAKING A FRESH GRIP

Foreign Legion Pushing On Against Rif

Snipers In Rocky Defiles Fail to Check Onward March of Attackers

By John O'Brien (Special United Press Correspondent) (Copyright 1925 by United Press) FEZ, Morocco, Aug. 8.—Smoking villages, men stilled by Rifians swarming among the cliffs like flies, tanks and armored cars, thundering artillery—all that is included in the panorama of war that is being waged only a few short miles northward.

I have just come back from the battlefield. There I have seen after the fashion of correspondents of the World War, a spectacle of fighting that in a few days has cost many Rifians their lives but has given the French a fresh grip on Fez El Bahi.

Perched on a block house near Kelaa, I had the privilege of watching a part of one of the most spectacular battles which the Rifian war front has known. There, through my field glasses I watched men of the foreign legion drive against masses of Rifians, entrenched in rocky defiles and saw how men as brave as any who ever shouldered a rifle, faced the terrors of the swarming Rifian snipers, coupled with a blaze of sun that made me wince.

Many deeds of heroism were coupled with the onslaught. The legionnaires went once against the entrenched men. Some fell as Rifian riflemen aimed. But they started again and yet again.

A Senegalese battled six of the Rifians. Two of them he killed. The other four he brought back to the French lines as prisoners.

This was only a part of the spectacle, for during my visit to the front, there was artillery action across the stretch from El Kelaa Sless to Fez El Bahi, which mowed down the enemy and fired villages and farm houses in the lowlands.

WASHINGTON WOODS BURN

SEATTLE, Aug. 8.—Forest fires over the state continued their devastation today, sweeping through logged off and virgin timber, destroying one small town, scorching a woodcutter and his son near Spokane, burning their horses and threatening the homes of suburban and rural residents around Puget sound.

Maple Falls, near Bellingham, was wiped out by the flames yesterday. Brush fires around Lake Stevens are steadily menacing homes in the district and large crews of fire fighters have been engaged in battling the flames.

Fires are still burning around Murphy's Corner and between Marysville and Sylvana. All county bridges are being guarded by special details from the county engineer's office.
