SELLING HEAVY IN OIL STOCKS

Market Reactionary in Early Part of Day

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Public selling of oil stocks at the opening of today's session affected the rest of the list and with few exceptions the market was decidedly reactionary during the first two hours with fairly heavy trading. While oils appeared to be under liquidation due to disappointing trade developments in the cutting of gasoline prices, the rest of the list finally got away from this influence. Several developments worked to bring this about, the first of which was an independent move in American Can common to a new high record price close to 222. Subsequently the United States Steel Corporation's unfilled tonnage statement for July showed a decline of 170,000 tons, a considerable improvement from the previous months which showed a decrease exceeding 300,000 tons. Money was not an important factor, ruling at 4 1/2 per cent. Brokerage opinion was heartily inclined toward some of the oils and motors, but it was felt that the railroads would come in for some favorable attention.

LEGAL NOTICES

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION
WHEREAS, the council of the City of Bend, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary to improve the street hereinafter described in the manner hereinafter set forth, and has required from the city engineer, plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement and estimate of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, and

WHEREAS, said engineer did forthwith prepare the same and did file such plans, specifications and estimates in the office of the recorder.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BEND, OREGON: That said plans and specifications and estimates be, and the same are hereby found satisfactory, and are hereby approved, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the council does herein and hereby declare its intention and purpose of making such improvement, to-wit:

SOUTH THIRD STREET in said city from the center line of Roosevelt Avenue to the southerly city boundary.

The improvement shall consist of the following:
First, grading to the proper subgrade.

Second, paving a central strip 20

feet in width with either Warrenite-Bituthic pavement on 4 inch crushed rock base, Warrenite-Bituthic pavement on a 3 inch bituminous base, or with concrete six inches thick, as may be determined by the council after bids shall have been opened.

Third, constructing a crushed rock or macadam shoulder three feet wide on each side of the pavement, to be backed up with suitable earth shoulders.

Fourth, such additional minor items of work as constructing drainage culverts, etc.

The engineer's estimate of the probable cost of said improvement being \$5276.00.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That for the purpose of raising the cost and expense of such improvement, there is hereby established a Local Improvement District No. 91; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That owing to the fact that this improvement project is entitled to aid from the proceeds of a bond issue to be made as authorized by the voters of the City of Bend at a special election held the 6th day of September, 1924, the sum of \$4026.00 is hereby declared to be the proper portion or proportion of the said bond issue to be applied on this improvement, leaving the remainder of the total final cost to be paid by the aforesaid local district.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the city recorder do give notice of the passage of this resolution by causing the same to be published once in The Bend Bulletin, a newspaper published in the city, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That objections and remonstrances may be filed with the recorder against the making of said improvement at any time within fifteen (15) days from the date of posting of this resolution, and the same will be considered by the council at its first regular meeting subsequent to the expiration of said fifteen (15) days.

WHEREAS, as it is necessary the said street be improved as early a date as possible in order that the present dangerous condition of the roadway be eliminated, and in order to do so it is necessary to adopt this resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this resolution shall go into force and effect upon its adoption and approval.
