

# Fighters Please Crowd With Ten Round Socking Match

## WOODS WINNER BY A DECISION

### Preliminary Events Over Quickly at Hip

Battling for 10 rounds and providing enough fight to hold local fans for several moons, Spec Woods and Ed Dean fought to a decision last night in the card staged under the auspices of the local bricklayers in the Hippodrome. Spec won the decision. More action was provided in the main event of the card than ever before seen in Bend. It is conceded by veteran fans of the local ring.

Although Woods was awarded the decision over Dean, there was nothing overwhelmingly decisive about the fight. Partisans of both fighters were claiming victory when referee Jack Barron raised the right hand of the Portland man. Neither man was sent to the canvas by blow, although Dean was on his knees once in the sixth when he slipped after missing a swing. Dean was severely punished by the heavy blows of the Portland fighter, especially about the lips, but this punishment in no way slowed the Bend man.

The first round opened with the fighters feeling each other out. Both were missing when they first unlimbered the leather. The end of the round was a forecast of the remainder of the fight, for immediately after feeling out his opponent, Dean waded into Spec and when the gong sounded the fighters were exchanging blows at close range. In the second round, Dean rushed Spec in his corner and for three minutes they fought at close range, exchanging blows to the face and body. At the end of this round, they were given the greatest ovation ever accorded fighters in Bend.

The remaining eight rounds were virtually a repetition of the second. Woods and Woods fighting at close range. Woods measured his swings more carefully than did Dean, who missed with his left frequently. In the third round it was evident that the three fights had weakened both Dean and Woods. If either had sufficient strength to land a good punch the fight would very likely have ended in the third. Dean landed frequent blows, but they did not bother Woods. In turn, Woods' jobs had little effect on the game and wily Dean, who was in the best of condition.

**Fight Hard to End**  
It was in the sixth round that Woods, at first visibly tired by the pace set by Dean, freshened, and for a time it appeared as if Dean would be unable to weather the attacks of the heavier man. But Dean soon demonstrated that he could take all Woods had. Dean tried to land left rights several times, but Woods, the shorter of the two, was not present in the orbit of the swings.

In the last three rounds of the fight, both men exchanged more blows from a distance. In the ninth it appeared as if Spec was using a bit of strategy in resting up for the final frame. Although not fighting so hard as in the previous rounds, Spec landed several rights and lefts. They had little effect on Dean, who retaliated at every opportunity. The fight ended with both endeavoring to land a knockout blow. As in every round of the match, they fought until the final second of the round. Dean waded in at 1:45 and Woods at 1:52, giving Woods an advantage of eight and one-half pounds.

**Knockouts Come Often**  
There was plenty of action in the preliminaries, but there was little scientific fighting. Freddie Gaspard and Cowboy Baxter were in the ring for less than one round. Freddie opened up with his heavy artillery, and in less than 50 seconds there were several towels and caps in the ring. When this fight was stopped, Freddie was still on deck hunting for someone to fight and Cowboy was in his corner, having called it a day. Fred Greeley and Battling Loop were next presented to the fans. Loop took the count in the second.

In the semi final, Earl Stolze had it all his own way. Earl Smith of Spokane got acquainted with the canvas in the first round, got better acquainted in the second, and in the third, after Stolze had connected with his jaw, his acquaintance with the canvas developed into a lasting friendship. He was counted out.

The curtain raiser was a bout between two midget fighters, Glen Lindsay and Young Marshall. This was a draw.

### MAY LIMIT AREAS OPEN TO FISHING

#### State Commission Defers Its Action on Metolius

Recommendation was made by members of the state game commission meeting recently in Portland that a greater area of East lake, in the Newberry crater, be closed to angling, and that silver side trout be planted to augment the present supply of Eastern Brook trout. Before the recommendation is acted on, an investigation is to be made.

Further indicating that game conditions in Central Oregon were given detailed consideration by the commission members at the recent meeting, is the fact that action was taken to keep the Crane prairie section of the Deschutes river closed to fishing. The upper portion of the Metolius river be closed to fishing was deferred. Investigations were ordered so that fishing conditions may be improved at Paulina lake, Elk lake and Blue lake.

Because game wardens found it both impossible and impracticable to use bus lines or trains in the line of duty and refused to pay for the operation of their own cars for state service, the commission decided to purchase two cars to determine whether state owned vehicles would be made feasible.

Reports made to the commission that there are now \$15,542 in delinquent fines outstanding caused the appointment of F. M. Brown, chief deputy game warden, to the task of obtaining this uncollected revenue. Brown is to be relieved of all other duties.

### TRAINING IS RESUMED FOR CHANNEL ATTEMPT

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) CAPE GRIS NEZ, France, Aug. 11.—Gertrude Ederle, resuming training this week for her coming battle with the tides, told the United Press today she is more confident than ever that she will be the first woman to swim the English channel.

"Of course I am terribly sorry Miss Harrison had to give up yesterday," the American girl said naively. "Then she brought a phonograph out onto the porch of her cottage here and danced and sang, apparently recovered from the indisposition which forced postponement of her swim."

Miss Harrison, who was forced to quit while in mid channel Monday evening, said she had been "beaten by the cold rain and the north wind which sprang up suddenly."

Miss Ederle now plans to start Monday if weather conditions are favorable.

DOVER, England, Aug. 11.—Frank Perks of Birmingham, an English swimmer, planned to start on a swim of the English channel at 7 p. m.

Perks was to swim from Dover to Calais, instead of northward from France as are the other swimmers now in training for the attempt.
