Quarantine Will Save From Potato Beetles

SALEM, Aug. 11.—A quarantine to protect Western and General Oregon from the Colorado potato beetle will be declared within the next two weeks against Idaho, Washington and several counties in Eastern Oregon, it was said here today by C. A. Parks, quarantine officer of the state board of horticulture. Morrow, Malheur, Umatilla and Wallawa will probably be the Oregon counties ruled against.

Quarter Million Value Of Confiscated Booze

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 11.—Seizure of \$250,000 worth of liquor and scores of arrests, including four women were the net results of a surprise clean up of this city by federal enforcement agents today.

One hundred and fifty dry agents, led by Chief E. C. Yellowley, descended on New Orleans without warning and this afternoon had made more than 50 raids in all parts of the city and suburbs.

Thirty automobiles were commandeered by the officers when the clean up started and other automobiles were placed at strategic points to bring in prisoners.

Coming to Capitol Last of This Week

ASSERTS DEMPSEY NEEDS MUCH WORK

Couldn't Keep Title If He Fought Now, Claimed

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—"Jack Dempsey's title will be in grave danger if he fights anyone this year," Jimmy De Forrest said today. "There are four heavyweights in the class who could stop the champion as he now stands."

De Forrest, who trained Dempsey for the Willard fight and who is now matchmaker for Charles A. Stoneham's Polo Grounds Athletic club, returned a few days ago from Los Angeles, where he had been looking over the champion.

The life of ease he has been leading and the recent development of a lot of business troubles are blamed by De Forrest for what he calls the "very bad condition" of the champion.

"Dempsey is badly worried about business affairs," he said. "He wants to get out from under his real estate holdings and he can't do it without standing a big loss. He's running around in circles."

"I watched him in the gym and it didn't take two minutes for me to see that he needs six months' hard work if he is to get back into anything like his old fighting form. He is slow on his feet and sluggish in his actions, his color is bad and there is no snap in his eyes. His heart does not seem to be in his work, but I believe that it is chiefly his business worries."

De Forrest said he didn't talk business with Dempsey because he felt nothing was doing this year. He said that Floyd Fitzsimmons, Michigan City pugilist, did sign Dempsey to fight Harry Wills next year—but there is a clause providing that Fitzsimmons must lay one million dollars down before the contract becomes binding.

Memorial Fund Campaign For O. A. C. Progressing

The O. A. C. Memorial Union fund drive in Deschutes and Crook counties is meeting with generous response from graduates and ex-students of the institution, it was reported today by W. E. COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Be it remembered, that a regular term of the county court of Deschutes county, in the state of Oregon, was begun and held at the court house in Bend, in said county, on Wednesday, the 5th day of August, 1925, said day being the day fixed by law for the holding of a term of the county court in said county, when were present Hon. Robert W. Sawyer, county judge; J. S. Innes, Geo. G. Sedwick county commissioners; J. H. Haner, county clerk; S. E. Roberts, sheriff. Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit: In the matter of claims.

Claims against the county were then presented and, after being audited, it was

Ordered that they be paid by warrants drawn on the various funds of the county, as follows:

Claims numbered 55, 60 to 71, inclusive, 73 to 83, inclusive, 86 to 89, inclusive, 92, 94 to 99, inclusive, 102 to 105, inclusive, 107, 109 to 112, inclusive, 116, 119, 120, 132 to 134, inclusive, and 138, by warrants drawn on the general fund of the county; claims numbered 34 to 37, inclusive, 42 to 54, inclusive, 56 to 58, inclusive, 93, 100, 117, 118 and 137, by warrants drawn on the road fund; claims numbered 1 to 32, inclusive, 113 to 115, inclusive, 121 to 130 inclusive, and 135, by warrants drawn on the market road fund; claims numbered 38, 39, 41, 106, 135 and 140 by warrants drawn on the 1923 Dalles-California fund; claim numbered 99 by warrant drawn on the dog fund; claim numbered 131 by warrant drawn on the bee fund; claim numbered 139 by warrant drawn on the 1923 Terrebonne-Lower Bridge fund.

In the matter of road-obstructions at La Pine.

This matter came on to be heard upon the complaint of citizens of La Pine with respect to the obstruction in a county road caused by the installation of a gas pump therein, and the court, having given said matter due consideration, referred it to the district attorney for appropriate action.

In the matter of official bonds.

There was then presented the bond of F. H. May as county road master, and the bond of Robert B. Gould as county engineer, and said bonds were ordered approved and placed on file. In the matter of lease on Packard truck.

There was then brought before the court a lease for a 1 1/2 ton Packard truck which the county was taking on lease from the state highway commission, and said lease was ordered executed by the court.

In the matter of road repairs.

A report from Lee Hill of the work required to be done in the repair of a county road in the vicinity of Millican was then presented, and upon its appearing that the county commissioners had personally inspected said road and were acquainted with the need of repair, it was

Ordered that the county cooperate in the repair of said road to the extent of \$100, said amount to be paid on the submission of proper vouchers and evidence that the work of repair had been satisfactorily completed.
