## Temporary Insanity Defense for Girl

### Fatal Wound Not Self Inflicted, Says Witness in Dorothy Ellingson Trial

 SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—Dorothy Ellingson, whose gay, mad career of parties and escapades in San Francisco's tin foil Bohemia came to an abrupt finale in the slaying of her mother, heard herself depicted in superior court here today as a "monstrous combination" with the intellect of a child and the physical development of a woman.

Her attorney, laying the ground work for the defense, told the jury in his opening statement that Mrs. Anna Ellingson, the murdered mother, was mentally unbalanced before Dorothy was born.

Asserting the girl's outlook on life to have been warped from birth, he said that she was suffering a spell of temporary insanity from the tremendous excitement at the time she signed a confession to shooting her mother.

**Attorneys Clash**

The first clash between attorneys occurred over the testimony of Dr. Selby P. Strange, autopsy surgeon of the San Francisco county and city hospital, who examined Mrs. Ellingson's body.

Dr. Strange testified that he found two fragments of a bullet behind the woman's right temple and that the course was such as to indicate improbability that the wound was self-inflicted.

Walter McGovern, defense counsel, challenged the statement, and sharp friction ensued between the girl's attorneys and the prosecution. Decision of the defense to fight every step of the state's case against Dorothy was demonstrated. The court finally allowed Dr. Strange's statement to go into the record.

**SHUMWAY SEEKS TOGETHER**

 PENDLETON, Aug. 12.—A. R. Shumway, rancher of Milton who is at present joint representative for Umatilla and Morrow counties in the state legislature, will be a candidate for the republican post of United States senator in the primaries in 1926, he has announced.

"I think I'll go through all right. I feel better and I'm not so nervous," the 17 year old "jazz girl" said.

The jury to try her was picked with unexpected rapidity, contrasting with the extended battle that marked the opening last March of the state's effort to convict her of matricide. Seven married women, several of them with daughters as old as Dorothy, and five men were accepted.

Questioning of jurors made it apparent the defense will rely upon insanity and contention that Dorothy's mother was shot by "Jimmy La Marr" for acquittal. It was expected the prosecution would counter with alliests declaring the girl sane and testimony to show that "La Marr" is a fictitious character.

## OFFICES PREPARED FOR SCHOOL CHIEF

### Now Are Located In Union High Building

After being more or less of a homeless wanderer for the last 10 years or more, the position of city superintendent of Bend's schools now carries with it a permanent location in offices especially designed for the school executive's duties.

Superintendent G. W. Ager today occupies the suite of offices which has been fitted up in the new union high school building. These are situated at the right of the main or north entrance to the building.

The well furnished suite consists of a main office with a counter over which administrative business of the superintendent's office will be conducted, a private office for the official with a thick carpet upon which, supposedly, either teachers or pupils may be "called" when occasion demand, and a commodious fire proof vault.

Across the corridor from these offices are those of the union high school principal, rooms which will be ready for occupancy by the time Principal Donald A. Emerson returns to begin his duties for the fall term.

Placing of desks and other equipment throughout the building is nearing completion.

# FIRE SITUATION GROWS BETTER

## Clouds and Mist Aiding Forest Guardians

### Many Workers Transferred From North Washington Woods to Aid Canadians

 PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Low hanging clouds and mists today brought the forest fire situation further in check today in the Willamette and lower Columbia river valleys.

High humidity not only aided fire fighters but served to clear the atmosphere of the heavy pall of smoke which has covered the Pacific northwest for several days.

No new fires have been reported in any section of the state during the past 24 hours, and existing fires are all under control. Low humidity and hot weather would again bring danger, however, it was said.

**MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 12.**—Light rains and abating winds brought relief to the fire fighters in southwestern Montana today.

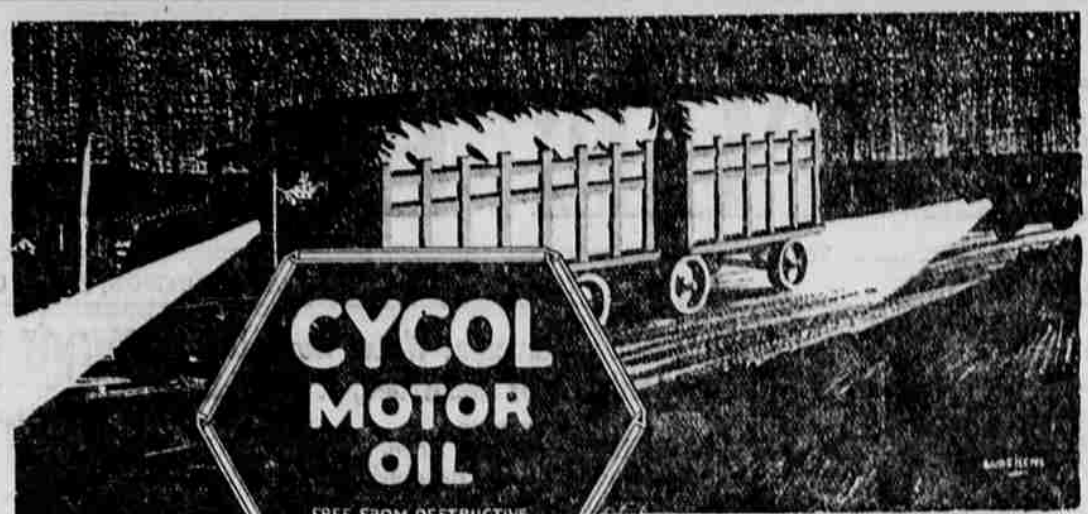
Many workers were transferred yesterday from these areas to the Canadian border where fires crossed from Canada into the Kanikau forest of northern Idaho and the Pend Oreille forest of northeastern Washington.

Capacity crews were still being maintained on the Idaho-Montana border where serious fires were burning in the Coeur d'Alene, Lolo and Clearwater forests.

The Falcon fire again broke out of control yesterday while hundreds of men were fighting a fire north of Libby which has already burned over nearly 29,000 acres of timber. It was spreading at a rate of 3,000 acres a day.

**OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 12.**—Fires in western and northern Washington were gradually being hemmed in today with favorable weather conditions.

The fire on the watershed of the Little Quilcene river was threatening timber in the Big Quilcene valley. More than 200 men have been fighting this blaze, which is said to be the most disastrous on the Olympic peninsula since the big Sol Duc burn about 20 years ago.

## School Budget Is Kept Within Limits of Law

members of the school board, pro-district.

This budget, it is explained by vides for the completion of the new union high school structures, aside from the projected auditorium which may be built at a future date. A bond issue of \$209,000 was voted for the new building last year. The difference between this amount and the final cost, \$275,999, has been provided for through budget items. Completion of the basement was not figured in the estimate made when the bond issue was floated.

**Salaries Big Item**

The largest item in the combined budget of the district for the 1925-26 school year is that of the salaries of teachers, principals, the superintendent and other employes. This item is \$128,752.94. Incidentally, this is the second largest payroll in Deschutes county, the local mills ranking

first. The greatest part of this payroll will be spent in Bend.

Members of the advisory budget committee are H. A. Miller, H. E. Van Arsdale, Don H. Peoples, A. J. Goggans and R. D. Moore. Members of the combined school boards of the Bend and union high districts are J. O. Gibson, H. E. Allen, J. H. Beburn, Mrs. Horace Richards and Clyde M. McKay. G. W. Ager is city superintendent of schools.

## Think United States Interested In Europe

 LONDON, Aug. 12.—America was regarded here today as taking more than a passing interest in the progress of the European safety pact negotiations, proceeding between British Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain and French Foreign Minister Briand.

The rather more direct interest of the United States was interpreted from the fact that American Ambassador Allanson B. Houghton was one of Chamberlain's guests at a dinner in honor of Briand, attended also by

the Belgian and Italian envoys. Furthermore, he had an invitation to lunch with Briand at the French embassy.

American sources said the two affairs were "purely personal."

But keen diplomatic correspondents scented further "unofficial" American participation in the situation. They pointed out that Houghton's long experience in Germany as the American envoy there had given him a sharp insight into the Central European situation and had qualified him admirably to inform President Coolidge on the progress of negotiations between the French and British foreign ministers. It was not suggested, however, that Houghton's role was other than "unofficial."
