Wife of Representative Had Parties, Testified

Detective on Stand Says Alleged Bootlegger Favored Caller of Mrs. Scott

 ALPENA, Mich., Aug. 12.—Mrs. Edna James Scott received Gilbert Bensinger, an alleged bootlegger, as a caller in her room at the Lee house, Washington, a deposition by Frederick Vincent Sykes, house detective at the hotel, stated at the Scott divorce trial here today.
 Sykes said he watched Bensinger and Mrs. Scott through a key hole.
 "They were cuddled up together," the deposition stated. "Often she was on his knee. It's pretty hard, you know, to see through a keyhole."
 Whiskey was their nightly indulgence, according to Sykes' deposition. Bensinger often took it into her room, he charged. For three weeks straight they went out in Bensinger's automobile, he asserted. Mrs. Scott seemed intoxicated.
 Sykes admitted "I've looked through a lot of key holes," but refused to answer this question: "Didn't you tell Mrs. Scott you peeked through a key hole and saw a congressman and his secretary eating strawberries in bed?"

PRESIDENT READY TO RETURN TO JOB

Real Rest Enjoyed In Vacation Period

 SWAMPSCOTT, Ark., 12.—President Coolidge started on the eighth week of his vacation today. He is rested and rejuvenated and ready to return to Washington but his plans now are to remain here until Labor day, unless a coal strike demands his presence at the capital.
 Coolidge feels that the seven weeks so far at the summer White House on the north shore have "set him up" physically, so well that he is prepared to carry through the hard legislative winter which is in prospect.
 The president, however, desires to be in Washington if the anthracite strike occurs on September 1, as seems likely now. He may go a week ahead of the strike date, or two weeks from today if the miners definitely call a walk out.
 This week and the president will spend with his father, Colonel John Coolidge, at Plymouth, Vt. He will leave here tomorrow or Friday and will return Monday or Tuesday.

Youth, Only Seventeen, Admits Killing Driver

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
 KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 12.—Fading of the body of A. R. Clawson, Cedarhurst N. Y., under a cult near Lamonte, Mo., today revealed Clawson's murder by Everett Adams, 17 year old Ohio school boy, who is under arrest in Garden City, Kan.
 The youth was arrested several days ago when he drove into Garden City, in a blood spattered automobile. At first he denied any knowledge as to how the blood stains got on the car, declaring he purchased the automobile in Terre Haute, Ind.
 Last night, however, he confessed to Garden City authorities that he shot and killed Clawson and hid the body under a culvert between Jefferson City and California, Mo. The murder, he said, took place after Clawson had given him a "lift" in the car. A desire to get possession of the automobile was given by the youth as his reason for killing Clawson.

Reports Attacks Made Upon Bulgarian Post

 LONDON, Aug. 12.—An Exchange Telegraph Constantinople message, unconfirmed from any other source, quoted newspapers as declaring the Greeks had attacked a Bulgarian frontier post at Caratepe. Fighting was reported to have continued until night fall and the incident was characterized as serious.
 The situation between Greece and Bulgaria, arising from the killing of a Greek in Bulgaria, was reported last week for the first time as offering the possibility of international complications in the Balkans. However, later advices indicated a pacific settlement was being reached, and the Greeks had not sent the proposed ultimatum to Bulgaria.

Miners to Sit Tight, Operators' Next Move

 ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 12.—With but 19 days remaining before the day set provisionally for a strike of 150,000 anthracite miners, the latter's leaders will make no further attempt to avert suspension unless the operators show a disposition to meet the workers' wage demands, John L. Lewis said today.
 "I said what I had to say in my last letter to Warriner," the president of the United Mine Workers said. "I have had no reply. I am not interested in further correspondence until the operators indicate they will abandon their opposition to the demands of the miners."

 LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—Joseph Ward, fugitive assistant cashier of the Bank of Benwood, Benwood, W. Va., confessed today, according to police, of participating in embezzlements totalling \$300,000.
 Ward was arrested in a fashionable tearoom here.
 He claimed other officials of the bank, one of them a fugitive also, were involved in the defalcations. The missing \$300,000, he said, was "milked" from the bank over a period of 25 years.
