

Victor Thought Too Badly Tired To Play For Davis Cup

JOHNSTON WINS BUT MAY LOSE

Committee Must Name Team August 20

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin.)
 NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—After losing Vincent Richards and Bill Johnston to play two hard test matches to decide the No. 2 place on the American Davis cup singles team, officials of the United States Lawn Tennis association today reported a final decision must await an executive session.

In a terrific five set match last Saturday that nearly caused the collapse of the two stars, Johnston defeated Richards, and again yesterday he proved his superiority over the youthful second ranking player by winning easily in straight sets.

Johnston proved beyond all doubt that he is a better singles player right now than Richards and if the association should fail to nominate him as Bill Tilden's helper in the singles matches there would be a violent protest from the Johnston camp, and they are by no means confined to his home territory in California.

In the test matches that were staged to decide the team that would play in the doubles match, Tilden and Johnston defeated Richards and Dick Williams, and now the committee is facing the doubt that Johnston is physically able to play in both the singles and doubles matches.

If so much had not been taken out of him in his singles tests against Richards, there might have been no doubt about his ability to carry such a heavy burden.

The committee has to name the team that will defend the cup on August 20, but it does not have to name the actual lineup.

The committee probably will tell the team privately how they are to play in the challenge round, but the announcement does not have to be made public until 24 hours before the matches.

MERELY A MILLION DECIDES DEMPSEY

Other Details of Fight Are Not Important

 LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—"I will fight for any promoter who can arrange a match with Harry Wills and guarantee me of least \$1,000,000 for my end of the match," Jack Dempsey reiterated today in an interview on the heavyweight title situation.

"I am not partial to any promoter," Dempsey said. "But now that I'm handling my own business affairs, I'm looking at things from a purely business point of view. It's the money that counts most—my next match must net me at least a cool million."

Dempsey denied reports he would not fight for Tex Rickard.

"That's not true," he said. "I never said I would not fight for Tex Rickard. I regard him just the same as the others. He's one of several bidders for the match and he can have it when he signs Wills and lays the money on the counter, taking care of me."

Dempsey declared emphatically he would never fight again in New York.

"I don't like the attitude of the New York boxing commission," he said, "and will absolutely refuse to put the mitts on in the state of New York."

"I will fight for Tex Rickard in Jersey City if we agree on terms. But I will not fight for him in New York."

The champion said again that Floyd Fitzsimmons, Michigan City promoter, had made him the best offer to date for the Wills match.

"It rather looks now as though Floyd will get the match," he said. "I told him and Paddy Mullins on the phone last night that I liked Fitzsimmons' proposition. I urged Paddy to get in touch with Wills and sign with Floyd for the bout."

"Fitzsimmons has offered me a million dollars, and he seems to have plenty of backing."
