Revolution Spreading Through French Syria
LONDON, Aug. 12.—The Central News Correspondent, quoting Adana reports, says that the Druz revolt in the French Syrian mandate is spreading.
The French were reported fearing that the neighboring Arab tribesmen would also rise.
The Druz clansmen were reported to have defeated a battalion of 500 Armenian volunteers.
The situation at Damascus was characterized as disquieting.
French Algerian troops arriving at Beirut were reported to have mutilated, whereupon they were re-embarked.
The message added that the Druz rebels are killing French prisoners in revenge for alleged French wounding of Druz sheiks.
