

New York Boxing Board Is Again Flouted By Dempsey

CHAMP LIKES ONE MAN RULE

No One But Jack Will Dictate Terms

 LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—Any action which the New York boxing commission might take to untangle the heavyweight championship situation and encourage a match between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills will be completely ignored by the titleholder.

The champion announced through the United Press today that he was "sitting in the driver's seat" and will personally dictate details of the next title match.

He declared positively he would fight Harry Wills, that he would demand his own terms and ignore absolutely both the New York boxing commission and Jack Kearns, his legal manager and former partner.

"I didn't care what the New York boxing commission has done or is going to do," declared Dempsey. "They don't mean a thing to me and after the way they have treated me, I'm through with them."

"I'm going to fight Harry Wills, remember that. And I'm going to arrange the match myself—write that down also."

"Furthermore, I will have plenty to say about the terms."

The champion literally chuckled at the scramble of Kearns, the boxing commission and promoters over the highly press agitated Wills bout.

"They aren't kidding me," he continued. "All I have to do is sit tight and wait for one of these promoters to raise a million dollars and put it in the bank for me."

"As for Doc Kearns, I'm 21 and can make my own contracts. I never saw the agreement that Doc had me sign when I was a youngster. All I recall is that I gave him my word of honor that he would get 33-1/3 per cent of my ring earnings."

"Now, if Doc behaves himself he will get his cut on the Wills fight. And if he doesn't, I may get sore enough to contest the agreement in court."

"My lawyers tell me that a contract such as Kearns holds is not legal—it's not equitable because I haven't got a copy of it myself, and Doc has refused to let me look at it."

"If Kearns signs me for a Wills match, it won't mean anything. If I like the terms, I may go through with them. If not, I'll similarly ignore the agreement."

Dempsey said he was "not particular" about where the fight will be staged. He made it clear, however, he would not appear in a New York ring.

"The Wills fight will draw just as much money in the middle west or even on the Pacific coast as it will in the east," he continued.

"I'm not worrying about where the match will be held. And I'm not worrying about the criticism in some quarters on a mixed bout."

"As a matter of fact, I have confidence in Floyd Fitzsimmons and have good reason to believe he has the necessary financial backing to put this match over."

CONTRACT POSTPONED
 NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Jack Kearns appeared before the New York state boxing commission today and promised that next Tuesday he would sign Jack Dempsey to an agreement to fight Harry Wills for the world's heavyweight champion-

At the same time Kearns told the commission that by tomorrow noon there would be an agreement filed with the commission for a fight between Mickey Walker, whom he manages, and Dave Shade of California, to take place in one of the New York or Brooklyn ball parks in September.

Fitzsimmons Is Ready To Post Huge Forfeit

 NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Floyd Fitzsimmons, Chicago fight promoter, left here this afternoon for Chicago, claiming to have a signed statement in his pocket binding Harry Wills to fight Jack Dempsey under his auspices in July or September, 1926, somewhere in the middle west.

He said he was prepared to post a deposit of \$700,000 or \$800,000 in Chicago to assure both Dempsey and Wills that he had the necessary backing to promote the match.

Wills and Dempsey will go to Chicago on or before September 20, Fitzsimmons said, to engage in a spectacular public signing of final articles for the bout, a ceremony which will be staged in an amphitheater so that thousands of people may attend.
