### STOCK BUYING SHOWS GAINS

#### Market Higher at Close of Session

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)  
NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—With call money in plentiful supply at 4 per cent and indications pointing to continued expansion in business activity, stocks gave another remarkable demonstration of vitality in today's session.

Prices continued to force ahead rapidly. Little attention was paid to brokerage advices that a technical reaction was long overdue.

American Can, Mack Truck, White, General Electric and a long list of other representative industrials soared to record levels. With the rails in new high ground for the present bull market, increasing activity marked dealings in this section.
