

Mickey Walker Signs Rickard Contract To Defend Title

TO MEET SHADE IN SEPTEMBER

Yankee Stadium Chosen For Fight

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
 NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, signed a contract today with Tex Rickard to defend his title against Dave Shade, California challenger, in the Yankee stadium, on September 29.

Walker had been given until midnight to live up to the agreement signed with the New York boxing commission to accept the Shade challenge and signed contracts were sent to the office of the commission before noon today by Jack Kearns, the champion's manager.

"We're glad now that all this controversy is over as it shows that Walker acted in good faith when he signed the agreement. We delayed action until the last minute, waiting for the best offer and Tex Rickard made the highest bid," Kearns said. The Polo Grounds Athletic club and the promoters at Eltham field in Brooklyn were also after the match. The commission notified Kearns yesterday that a late September date would be satisfactory, as Walker had been signed for three matches in East Chicago, Cleveland and Minneapolis.

Canada Planning Aid Against Rum Runners

 VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 15.—British Columbia is going to have a dry navy to stop rum runners, similar to that of the United States.

Provincial police have obtained a speed boat which they will ask the government to recondition for special coast guard service to prevent smuggling of liquor into the United States. The vessel will be armed with a one-pound gun and be equipped with a crew large enough to board rum ships.

In the meantime local customs authorities have seized three fast rum running boats which they are asking the dominion government to turn over to them to be used in fighting the smugglers' traffic.

It is planned to add these and other fast craft to the first boat acquired for British Columbia's dry navy.


