SEEK FUGITIVES BEYOND OREGON CHASE COOLING

Motorist Gives Clue to Convict Trio

MEN THOUGHT GONE

Thorough Examination In Waldo Hills Country Gives No Results to Searchers

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 17.—Following reports that three men resembling the escaped convicts from the Oregon penitentiary had been seen in Yolo county near here, Sacramento police and deputy sheriffs were on watch for the suspects today.

A motorist giving the name of Thatcher telephoned local police that he had seen three men sleeping along the road in a large automobile early Sunday near Dunigan, Yolo county.

Thomas Murray, one of the convicts who escaped in the sensational break, was arrested here several years ago and is known to have friends in this vicinity.

Ellsworth Kelly and James Willos are the other fugitives who have been the object of an extensive manhunt since the prison break of last week.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17.—Interest in the manhunt for three escaped Salem convicts and murderers—Tom Murray, James Willos and Ellsworth Kelly—began to slacken today.

Tracks, Socks Found
Some possesmen still expressed belief that the men were still hiding in the Waldo hills country, which had been given a pretty thorough examination in the last few days by hundreds of searchers.

But the fact that the upper reaches of Drift creek were searched yesterday without finding a trace of the desperadoes made leaders declare that it would be difficult to keep their posses on the job if no hot clues turn up.

The most that rewarded searchers yesterday were footprints found along a creek bank, and an old pair of socks. The marks on the shoes looked as if they might have been worn by prisoners, but the socks were not of the regulation prison type.

Regardless of whether these were left by the fugitives, there was nothing about these clues to indicate that any of the convicts were still in the vicinity.

CAR IS STOLEN
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17.—Possibility that the escaped Salem convicts and murderers—Tom Murray, James Willos and Ellsworth Kelly, may be heading north was considered by possesmen this afternoon when it was reported that an automobile was stolen at Monitor, near Mount Angel, at 2 a. m. today.

Four men were seen fleeing in the stolen machine, which belonged to a farmer named Lawrence Jacobson.

The theft of the automobile and a report that a cow belonging to John Diehl, a farmer on the Abegunah river between Silverton and Salem, had been milked dry, gave rise to the theory that the desperadoes may have escaped the cordon around the Waldo hills.

Posses hunting in the Waldo hills country surrounded a patch of brush about seven miles south of Silverton today where ranchers reported smoke at dusk Sunday night.

The search revealed no trace of the convicts.

Robert La Follette, Jr. Out to Succeed Father

Girl Killed, Others Hurt In Frisco Taxicab Wreck

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—A 22 year old girl is dead, her companion dying and three other men are seriously injured as the result of a downtown taxi wreck this morning.

Miss Estelle Nelson, nurse, lost her life in the crash. Cecil C. Stall, in whose car she was riding, was probably fatally injured.

Central Oregon Motorists Prepare for New Law Which Is to Go Into Effect In Next Few Weeks

Lights Must be Regulated to Conform With State Ruling Which Becomes Operative on September 1—Traffic Officer Houston Explains Regulations

Conforming to the law passed at the last session of the state legislature, a considerable number of Central Oregon motorists have had their headlights adjusted and their machines provided with approved lighting equipment, according to Earl B. Houston, state traffic officer, but with only 14 days remaining until the new regulations go into effect, it is predicted by Houston that light adjusting stations will be doing a land office business between now and September 1.

EXPLORERS TO TRY FOR BETTER SPEED

Race With Winter From Now on Realized

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—With the arctic night and a continent of ice closing in upon the MacMillan expedition, its naval flyers are headed toward Cape Thomas Hubbard and the hypothetical land in the gloom of the pole, according to radio reports from MacMillan at Etah, Greenland, to the National Geographic society here today.

Despite ill luck and treacherous winds, two intermediate aviation bases have been established by the planes at Sawyer bay and Flagler ford, Ellesmere land, with Cape Hubbard only 150 miles away, he said.

With the damaged Na-2 repaired and the three planes equal to the increasing strain, only two obstacles are feared now by the flyers—the fast setting sun and winter in its wake and the possible absence of landing places between Cape Hubbard and the polar sea.

"New ice is forming on the lakes about Etah, warning us that winter is coming and that we have little time to accomplish our undertaking," MacMillan said.

Large Acreage Closed In National Forests

Over 400,000 acres of national forest lands in Oregon and Washington have been closed to the public this summer on account of the fire hazard, it is announced by District Forester C. M. Granger of Portland, a recent visitor in Bend.

In Oregon, seven areas have been closed, totaling 215,650 acres. Some of the areas are: Deschutes national forest, Crane prairie region, 15,400 acres; Crater Lake national forest, Ashland watershed, 12,160 acres; Umatilla national forest, Mills creek watershed, 22,000 acres. In Washington there are 19 closed areas, totaling 257,160 acres. These regions are designated as areas of extreme fire hazard, and are closed under trespass regulation of the United States department of agriculture.

"We do not like to close parts of the national forests to the camping and traveling public during the vacation season," Granger recently said in a public announcement. "However, these closed areas contain slash or other high hazards, and we cannot afford to take the chances. If the public cannot learn to be careful with fire in the woods, then we as guardians of this valuable property are compelled to keep the public out. Most of our visitors are careful with fires and smoking material. A minority is careless or thoughtless, so all must be inconvenienced because of this minority."

Canadian Commission Heads for Washington

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 17.—A Canadian commission left here today for Washington, empowered to effect cooperation with the United States government to end rum running and narcotic smuggling across the border.

The commission is composed of Robert R. Farrow, deputy minister of customs and excises, Stuart Edwards, deputy minister of justice, W. W. Corey, deputy minister of the interior, and other officials.

Canada is making this move in an effort to bring about an international agreement and cooperation which will put a stop to the rum and drug traffic between the two countries. A pact signed here by the United States and Canada two years ago admittedly has proved an ineffective instrument.

CCAR RUNS AWAY, BOY DIES

WALLA, WALLA, Wash., Aug. 17.—Charles E. Thompson, 13, was killed yesterday when an automobile he was driving ran away out of control down a hill near Prescott. The father, W. H. Thompson, was badly injured.

Apparently some confusion has arisen as to whether motor vehicles operated in daylight hours only must be equipped with headlight devices in conformity with the provisions of the new law, Houston says. Quoting from a letter from Sam A. Kozor, secretary of state, Houston answers this question as follows:

"Every motor vehicle, except motorcycles, operated or driven upon the public highways of this state shall exhibit during the period from one hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise, and at times when fog or other atmospheric conditions render the operation of said motor vehicle dangerous to traffic or the use of the highways, two head lamps of approximately equal candle power, not in excess of 21 candle power."

From this reading it is explained by the secretary of state, it would appear that such equipment is not necessary unless the motor vehicle is operated under the conditions set forth.

In discussing this phase of the new lighting regulations, Houston mentions that he will have no right to arrest a motorist in the hours of daylight who has not complied with the new law, but nevertheless he plans to advise them to have their headlights adjusted.

The old magneto type of headlights will not meet the requirements of the law, and all cars operating under this type of illumination must be re-equipped with electric or acetylene systems before they can operate on the public highways on and after September 1.

When headlights are properly equipped and adjusted under the new ruling, it is possible to stand in front of a machine at night and look directly into the lights without being blinded by the glare, it is explained by Houston. All devices approved by the secretary of state have been passed on by the United States bureau of standards.

Funeral Service Held For Financier's Wife

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 17.—Another threatening letter purporting to be from George "Dutch" Anderson, pal of Gerald Chapman, the super bandit, and alleged killer of Ben Hance and his wife at Muncie, Ind., was in the hands of William J. King, private detective, today.

The letter was written on stationery of the Colonial hotel, Cleveland, and was posted at 8:30 p. m. Saturday.

"You may think newspaper publicity will help you but it won't. You are next," the letter said.

King, who was responsible for the imprisonment of Reginald Forsythe, another of Chapman's pals, received a letter Saturday signed "Dutch," warning him "he was next."

The first message was posted in Toledo. The detective said he was leaving Columbus in an effort to pick up Anderson's trail.

MILL BUILDER SEES CONVICT SUSPECTS

Speeding Car on Klamath- Medford Road Reported

Fred Horstkotte, sawmill architect who designed and superintended the building of the Shevlin-Hixon mills here, may have been one of the last persons who have seen the three escaped convicts and murderers from the Oregon state penitentiary, Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelly and James Willos.

Horstkotte was in Bend Sunday on his way to Portland from California, having stopped also at Klamath Falls.

He reported that while crossing Green Springs mountain on the highway between Medford and Klamath Falls, his automobile was forced almost into the ditch by a car coming from Klamath Falls and traveling at least 60 miles an hour.

Little was thought of it at the time by Horstkotte and his party, but on arriving in Klamath Falls they were questioned by officials there and learned that the car they had seen answered the description of the one stolen there at about the same time that a garage was held up by three men believed to be the escaped convicts.

SALEM, Aug. 17.—J. V. Starrett, parole officer at the state prison, resigned today as a result of the killing last Wednesday of two guards when three convicts made their escape.

Bend Alumni Will Attend Funeral of P. L. Campbell

A number of students and alumni of the University of Oregon plan to leave for Eugene tomorrow morning by the way of the McKenzie pass to attend the funeral services of P. L. Campbell, president of the state university, who died Friday. The services are to be held in the main auditorium of the woman's building at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

CAREFUL QUEST FOR MURDERER PROVES FUTILE

Revenge Killer Gives a New Warning

DETECTIVE TARGET

Man Who Helped In Arrest of Super-bandit Declared to be Next on List

MUNCIE, Ind., Aug. 17.—George "Dutch" Anderson, notorious outlaw charged by police with the murder of Ben Hance and his wife near here Friday night, may be on the way to an outlaws' rendezvous in the Florida everglades, Police Chief Standolph said today.

Not a single concrete clue to Anderson has been found despite the careful search conducted by police and deputy sheriffs of scores of cities. Last night police surrounded a cornfield on a tip that a man resembling Anderson was camped there. An abandoned camp was found and police think Anderson spent Friday night there.

Charles "One Arm" Wolfe, arrested shortly after the killing, has a "perfect alibi," his attorney told police. Wolfe is charged with having aided Anderson in the murder, which police say was inspired by Gerald Chapman, super bandit, awaiting death for killing a Connecticut policeman. Hance, who housed Chapman for several months, betrayed him to police.

A coroner's inquest into the double murder was scheduled for later in the day. Tomorrow a double funeral service will be held for the victims.

NEW NOTE COMES

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Scientists Observing Fatigue Marathoners

Psychological Tests Made On Exhausted Students

Eight Able to Continue Without Sleep For 60 Hours When Sufficiently Amused

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—George Washington university's eight fatigue marathoners, who successfully completed their 60 hours sleepless test last night, were dragged from the arms of morpheus today for observation by the scientists.

Swollen eyed and stiff from their long vigil, the partially rested young men and women submitted with wry smiles to stethoscopes and laboratory apparatus. Then they straggled in for the final psychological tests, which are to determine the effects of fatigue on mental reactions.

Dr. Frederick A. Moss, head of the psychology department, who watched the students throughout their long combat with sleep, had dark circles under his blood shot eyes as he came in today to finish the examinations of his "specimens."

Before the marathon was won last night, every known expedient had been used to keep the young people awake. At first their regular routine, then a hall game between the world champions and New York Yankees, night rides on country pikes, astronomy lessons before dawn, games, crossword puzzles, and finally jazz drove creeping sleep away.

Agas of the specimens range from 17 to 23 and the number of men and women are evenly divided.

VANCOUVER STARTS CENTENNIAL TODAY

Pageant Tells History of Old Pioneer Outpost

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 17.—The city of Vancouver turned its eyes backward a hundred years today and started to celebrate its centennial anniversary.

Fort Vancouver, the western outpost of the Hudsons Bay Trading Company, was established March 19, 1825, and then began the long rule over the Oregon country by Dr. John McLoughlin, "the father of Old Oregon."

The history and romance of the old British fort will be told in a pageant, "The Coming of the White Man," which will open the centennial celebration at 7 o'clock tonight.

Governor Hartley will arrive late today from Camp Lewis. In an airplane piloted by Oakley G. Kelly, representatives of other Washington cities, representatives of the Hudsons Bay Company and others will attend a banquet which will prelude the formal opening of the centennial.

Husband Attacks Rival, Gives Fractured Skull

PORTLAND, Aug. 17.—Marvin Yost, Stockton, Cal., was in St. Vincent's hospital today suffering with a fractured skull which resulted from a fight with an enraged husband.

The husband was H. O. Weatherall. He was suspicious of his wife and overheard her make a date with Yost yesterday. Weatherall went to the rendezvous and started in on Yost with his fists. Yost, police learned, was knocked down and apparently suffered the fracture in falling.

At the hospital Yost admitted paying attentions to the woman, but he said he did not know she was married.

Prominent Men Arrested In Raid On Road House

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 17.—A sheriff's raid on the alleged road house conducted by Mrs. Nellie Pence, near Fir, Hood River county, at 1 o'clock Sunday morning, resulted in the arrest of several prominent men of Portland and The Dalles, who this morning are before the local court on a charge of violating the prohibition law.

ELLINGSON TRIAL MARKS TIME AGAIN

Jazz Girl's Sheik Sought as Witness In Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—Trial of Dorothy Ellingson, "Chinatown jazz girl," for the murder of her mother halted here today while bailiffs sought Dave Stein, one of her former companions, to enforce a court order that he testify for the defense.

Stein, at whose home Dorothy attended a party the night after her mother was killed, was in court earlier in the day, but disappeared before he could be called to the stand.

Stein's story of Dorothy's actions at the party, only a few hours after her mother's death allegedly at her own hands, was expected by the defense to clinch the claim that the girl was insane.

The defense will rest after Dorothy's "sheik" has testified, and the prosecution will proceed to rebuttal evidence, summoning alienists who will assert the girl sane, with the same tests, the same words and same positiveness that defense experts said she was insane.

Earl Ellingson, brother of the "butterfly girl," was on the stand in her defense, brought here by threat of a bench warrant if he did not testify. He cited times when she had been scolded for her "night life" and told how he had found a bottle of gin in her closet.

Commercial Club Asked To Inspect Farm Lands

Directors of the Bend Commercial club have been extended an invitation by officials of the Deschutes County Municipal Improvement district to visit the Tumalo lands Wednesday, accompanying members of the desert land board and the state securities commission.

The state officials, including Governor Walter M. Pierce and Sam A. Kozor, secretary of state, will arrive here from Salem Wednesday morning. They will leave shortly after their arrival for the Tumalo lands to make their inspection.

In honor of the visiting officials, a picnic luncheon will be held on Tumalo island Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Short addresses will be made by the governor and members of the securities and desert land board.

Fleeing Debtor Slain By Deputy In Douglas

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 17.—Douglas county authorities were making an investigation today of the killing of D. W. Goforth by Deputy Sheriff Grubbe of Elkton.

An investigation is being made by State Traffic Officer Earl B. Houston to determine the exact cause of the accident, whether due to temporary blindness caused by the glare of the setting sun, or condition of the road.

Aside from Billy there are two younger children in the family—Robert, who was with his mother and who accompanied her on her return to Bend, and Mary Ellen, who had been at Newport. She was met in Eugene and brought home by H. S. McClure.

Torrence H. Foley was a native of Newfoundland. He was born at Placentia, a seaport town of the island, on December 1, 1879. His father was the captain of a schooner which put out of Placentia bay.

Married in Alaska
In his youth Foley's parents moved to Cambridge, Massachusetts. There he obtained an excellent groundwork in the electrical business. About the time of the Klondike gold rush he started to work his way west, eventually reaching Alaska, where he prospected and mined for a time.
