

# DEBT PAYMENT TO BE DECIDED

## Belgian Question Is Put Up to Coolidge

### Close Secrecy Veils Negotiations Over \$480,000,000 Owed United States

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) PLYMOUTH, Vt., Aug. 17.—President Coolidge today was faced squarely with the responsibility for obtaining settlement of foreign war debts of \$12,000,000,000, only one-third of which has been funded.

Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon and Senator Smoot, Utah, republican, both members of the American debt funding commission, came to this little mountain pass village to bring to the president's attention consideration of the deadlock at Washington over the \$480,000,000 Belgian debt.

Although close secrecy has marked the negotiations, the situation is believed to be as follows:

Belgian representatives have refused to accept terms parallel to those accepted by Great Britain two years ago; they have offered a plan of a moratorium of 10 years or more, during which they will not be required to pay either principal or interest, with a low interest and repayment rate thereafter.

Secretary Mellon is expected to suggest that President Coolidge decide whether the Belgian offer shall be accepted. This decision will be made on the basis of the president's belief of the ability to get congress to approve the terms.

Upon the settlement of the Belgian debt depends in large part the consummation of the French debt of \$1,000,000,000 and the Italian obligations of nearly \$2,000,000,000. French and Italian delegations are coming to Washington soon to go over exactly the same ground, and the three late allies can be expected to offer a united front in their attitude toward debts.

It is unlikely that an announcement of the president's decision will be made until after Mellon and Smoot have returned to Washington and communicated with the Belgian commission.

President and Mrs. Coolidge probably will return to the summer White House at Swampscott tomorrow. Their return to Washington is expected within a week.

# CHINESE EXTENDED HINDUS' SYMPATHY

## Resolutions Are Sent After Meeting In California

Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) MARYSVILLE, Cal., Aug. 17.—Seven hundred Hindus from all parts of the Sacramento valley, meeting here yesterday, adopted resolutions of sympathy for the Chinese struggle for freedom, and ordered the resolutions communicated to the leaders of the movement in China and to prominent Chinese in the United States.

The resolution was unanimously adopted after the question had been discussed by U. S. Bains, Hindu scholar of this city, and Dalip Singh Gill, eminent traveler, now touring the United States for the Afghanistan government.

Meetings also cabled congratulations to leaders of Mahatma Ghandi non violence movement when cables from India were read to the meeting announcing that the British government had returned to the natives certain temples which had been seized.

Then he gave up mining to take charge of the power plant at Fairbanks. It was while in Alaska that he met Miss Alice Adams, a graduate of the University of Oregon, who in 1906 became his wife.

He came to Bend 15 years ago at the suggestion of Floyd Dement who had known him in the northern town, and who had already located in Bend and established himself in the hardware business. Arriving here Foley found employment with A. M. Drake, working directly under Frank Robertson in Drake's power and light development. He continued under Drake's interests were taken over by the Bend Company, and became manager when Chicago capital effected another change of ownership of the property. In the year after the world war he was advanced again, this time to general management. He held the same position through succeeding changes of ownership, and had become a vice president of the company as well. In both these offices, his judgment was relied on implicitly by the owners of the company, and developments made here by the company involving the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars, were almost entirely on his recommendations.

Community Work Important Foley was prominent in many branches of community and civic work including the commercial club, boy scouts, Bend Amateur Athletic club, and others. In the world war, in addition to many preparedness activities in which he joined, he took training at Eugene in readiness for field duty. At the time of his death he was exalted ruler of Bend lodge No. 1371, B. P. O. E. He was first president of the Bend Volunteer Fire department, and last year headed the Red Cross.
