

New Crucial Series Looms Between Giants And Pirates

FIVE CONTESTS IN THREE DAYS

Many Possibilities Held For Rivals

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Property rights in the 1925 National league pennant may be decided here over the week end when the Pittsburgh Pirates and the New York Giants meet in the most important series of the season.

The two leading contenders for the National league and of the world's series are scheduled to meet in five games, jammed into three days with a doubleheader on Friday and Saturday and a single game on Sunday.

This series has as many possibilities as that memorable encounter between Giants and Reds late in 1919 when the Cincinnati club clinched the pennant by sweeping a six game series from the Giants that was played in three days.

The Giants are now three games behind the Pirates.

By sweeping the series, the Giants could regain first place by a margin of two games on the Pirates. On the other hand, the Pirates, by sweeping the series, could just about put the pennant in the bag and they would only have to coast in for the rest of the season.

NEW YORK, August 19.—The Giants, by defeating Chicago while the Pirates were taking a drubbing from the Robins, edged within two full games of the league leaders today. The Giants had a hard tussle winning 7 to 6 and victory came after Bentley, Wisner, Dean and Hantziwer had been driven to the showers.

British Woman Takes Easy Victory at Net

It was the most complete rout an American star has suffered thus far in the tournament. In the first set Mrs. Jessup was able to amass but five points. She improved in the second set, carrying two games to deuce, but was no match for the mastery of her opponent.

Salt Lake Club Manager Indefinitely Suspended

Registration of Autos From Outside Heavier

Registration of non resident motor vehicles in Oregon for the month of July, 1925, exceeded that for the corresponding month of 1924 by 2,983 and of July, 1923, by 9,657. For the first seven months of 1925 the registrations, amounting to 47,545, exceeded the total for the year 1923, May 24 to December 31, by 4,055.

For the corresponding period of 1924 the registrations were 44,376 and 13,357 from May 24 to July 31, 1923.

Over half of the July registrations, or 11,961, gave California as their residence, and nearly half of the total number of foreign cars coming into the state last month, or 9,494, registered at the Ashland and Medford stations. Ashland registered 6,712, Medford 2,732, and Portland was third with 2,056 registrations. Grants Pass registered 1,656. East of the

Cascades Ontario station was first with 1,091; Klamath Falls second with 959; The Dalles third with 479; Pendleton fourth with 369, and Nyssa fifth with 355.

Every state in the United States except South Carolina was represented in the July registration and the visitors from without the confines of the United States numbered: Canada, 281; Hawaii, 23; Alaska, 13, and Canal zone, 3. From states east of the Rocky mountains the registrations exceeding 200 motor

vehicles were Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, with 296 from Colorado, 236 from Utah and 223 from Montana. States registering over 100 machines east of the Rockies were Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin.
