BUYERS SHOW NEW CAUTION

Brokerage House Warns Hedged

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Speculative enthusiasm was tempered with greater caution in today's session and few sharp advances took place in the Industrials and the trading grain showed a disposition to take more consideration of the remarkable volume of traffic the railroads are handling.

This tendency was reflected in activity at rising prices in various representative carrier stocks. But on the whole it was evident that brokerage house warnings regarding the over bought situation in the general industrial list were receiving more respect.

Ample justification for the recent advance in the railroad average to the highest levels since 1917 was afforded in the traffic figures for the week of August 8.

The period ending on Monday was the fourth consecutive week this year in which loading exceeded the 1,000,000 mark.
