

Helen Wills Continues To Win In Championship Tourney

PLAY INDOLENT AT THE FIRST

Molla Mallory, Too, Is Winner on Court

WEST SIDE TENNIS CLUB, Aug. 20.—Miss Helen Wills, although far from her best, proved to be more than a match for Joan Fry, youthful member of the visiting British team, and won her way today to the semi-finals of the women's national tennis championship by defeating the little English girl 4-6, 6-0, 6-2.

Miss Wills will meet Miss Eleanor Goss of New York, who defeated Mrs. Lambert Chambers of England in the fourth round 6-2, 11-9.

In the other semi-final bracket, Mrs. Molla Mallory, victor over Miss Penelope Anderson 6-2, 6-4, meets Miss Kathleen McKane, who beat Miss Elizabeth Ryan 3-6, 7-5, 6-2.

The national champion played indolently today in the first set of her match with Miss Fry, but after she warmed to her work, the English player could not match the severity, power and accuracy of Miss Wills' strokes.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 20.—An upset marked the first match in the fourth round of the women's national tennis championships at Forest Hills today when Miss Eleanor Goss of New York took the measure of the veteran English player, Mrs. Lambert Chambers, in straight sets, 6-2 and 11-9.

Miss "Kitty" McKane, former British champion, defeated Miss Elizabeth Ryan 3-6, 7-5, 6-2.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Rough spots on the hard road she must travel to another championship blocked the path of Helen Wills, the youthful American tennis champion, when she went into the fourth round of the women's national singles championships at the West Side Tennis club today.

Miss Wills today faces Joan Fry, the 19 year old British girl who was the runner up to Mlle. Lengien in the Wimbledon championship this year, and if form does not turn back she will have to beat Mrs. Lambert Chambers, the veteran champion of the British team, in the semi final round and then face Miss Elizabeth Ryan, the former California star, in the final round for the title.

The luck of the draw favored the young American champion for one of her most serious rivals will be eliminated today in the match between Miss Ryan and Kathleen McKane, the former British champion, who has been playing the most brilliant tennis of the tournament. She looked like a champion yesterday when she overwhipped Mrs. Marion Jessup in a love match.

Mrs. Molla Mallory, former American champion, meets Miss Penelope Anderson, Richmond, Va., and she ought to survive the round and become the semi final opponent of the winner of the Ryan-McKane match.

Mrs. Lambert Chambers, whose game and endurance have been the marvel of the tournament, meets Miss Eleanor Goss in the fourth match and she ought to win as she beat the American girl last week in the Wightman cup matches.

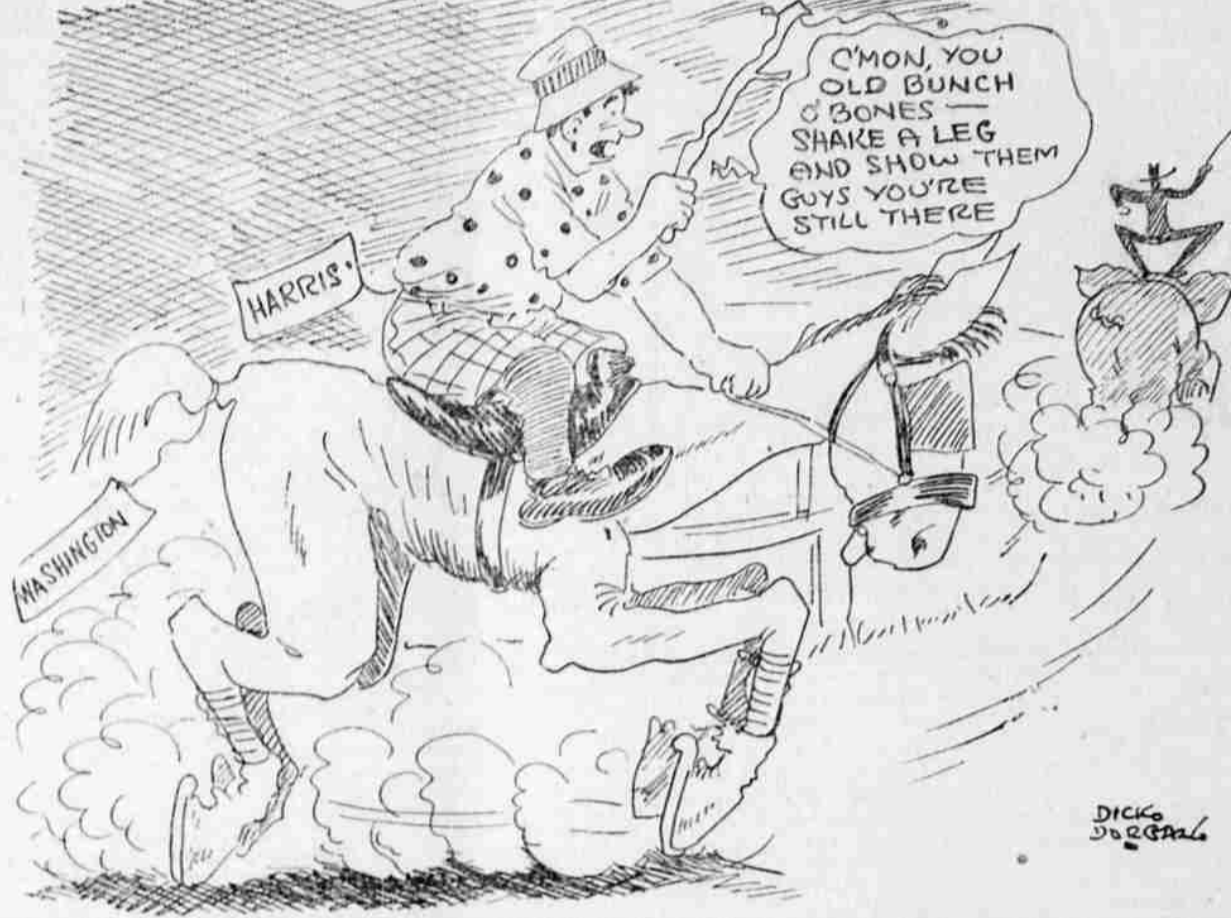
