

Al Watrous Taking Lead For Western Golf Championship

HAS TWO CARDS OF 70 A PIECE

Johnny Farrel of New York In Second Place

YOUNGSTOWN COUNTRY CLUB, Youngstown, Ohio, Aug. 21.—Al Watrous, Grand Rapids, Mich., professional, went into the lead in the western golf championship this afternoon when he turned in 70, a duplicate of his yesterday's score, to give him temporary championship with 140 strokes for the 26 holes.

Others who polished up their averages for the two days were:
 Leo Diegel, New York, Canadian-born champion, who repeated his 72 hit yesterday, to go into a tie with another finisher.

Johnny Farrel, New York star, had the lowest score of the day and went into second place by taking a score on the second 18 holes today.

Farrel's total was 142. He took three birdies on his first nine and three on his second. Three times he scored 20 foot putts and his chip shots were only put him on the green.

But Bill Melhorn, Chicago, present Panzer champion, scored a 75 to throw him into the 139 group, while

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GOLFERS SET OUT ON SECOND ROUND

Rain dampens players who qualified Thursday

YOUNGSTOWN COUNTRY CLUB, Youngstown, Ohio, Aug. 21.—Ten golfers with scores of 70 or better and 68 golfers with 75 or better for the first 18 holes of the Western open golf championship set out in a drizzling rain this morning on the second day's play.

Larry Nabholz, youthful professional at the Cedarhurst Country Club of Cleveland, with a low of 67 for the first 18 holes, left a mark for all the sharpshooters to shoot at.

Emmett French, professional at the Youngstown Country Club and Donald Carrik, a young Canadian amateur champion, with a 69 apiece were close on Nabholz's heels and French, with the advantage of playing on his home course, was favored to be near the top at the finish.

At Watrous, Grand Rapids, Mich., former winner of the Canadian open, who has never finished out of the money in the national open, and Lloyd Gullickson, Columbus, have 79's, and are considered a good chance to win.

Walter Hagen has a 71 but his consistency made it likely that he would repeat today while some of the younger golfers who were in the sixties yesterday may be shooting today.

Wallace Nelson, Indianapolis, who turned in a card of 70 for the second 18 holes today, giving him a 74-70-144, almost surely qualified him for the final round tomorrow.

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Australians Eliminate Japanese Cup Players

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CHESTNUT HILLS, Mass., Aug. 21.—The Australian Davis cup team triumphed over Japan again today when the Australians won the doubles match, 6-1, 5-2 and 9-7.

Hawke and Patterson of Australia made a fast start in the first set and carried it away with comparatively little resistance as they did the second, but in the third Harada and Shimizu of Japan displayed a dazzling array of shots which taxed the Australians to the limit and carried the set to 16 games.

By winning the doubles Australia carried away the honors in the America zone and won the right to play France, winner in the European zone, in the semi-finals at Forest Hills, N. Y., beginning September 1. The winner of the semi-finals will play the American team for the Davis cup.
