ATTACK FORESEEN
EAST LAS VEGAS, N. M., Aug. 22.—Carl C. Magee, editor of the New Mexico State Tribune, today gave his version of the accidental shooting of John B. Lassiter here last night.

Magee's statement follows:
"Of course, I am heartbroken over the killing of Lassiter but my conscience is absolutely clear."
"I am a member of the insane asylum board here and came here to attend a meeting."
"Judge Leahy, who is an extremely powerful man physically, has been threatening me for months. I therefore have carried a small .25 calibre revolver when here."
"I was sitting on a divan in the lobby of my hotel about 8 o'clock Friday night. I was being interviewed by a lady reporter of the Optic (a local newspaper) as to what had transpired at the board meeting."
"I saw Leahy come into the lobby and walk down the aisle towards me."
Bullet Breaks Arm
"I kept my eyes on him until he passed me but did not speak to him or rise. After passing me he whirled and hit me on the jaw, dropping me to the floor."
"I was dazed."
"Leahy kicked me several times, breaking two ribs."
"The coil revolver had dropped from my pocket on the floor. I seized it with my left hand and fired at Leahy. As I shot, Lassiter jumped to grab Leahy and was hit."
"As Lassiter fell, Leahy rushed at me violently. I was still on the floor. I shot twice, breaking Leahy's left arm above the elbow. This stopped him."
"I am writing this in bed, where I am nursing broken ribs and a swollen jaw."
"I have instructed my attorneys to demand my arrest, a grand jury indictment and a jury trial at once. I want this thing cleared definitely, finally and legally. I am guilty of no fault. It was a terrible accident."

Judge Attacks, Editor Shoots, Death Outcome

the nature of the complaint. While technically under arrest, Magee is still confined to his room in a hotel here.

Magee had instructed his attorneys to insist on his formal arrest, arraignment and commitment to the grand jury. He said he wished the record cleared immediately.

Writer Beaten
Magee was attacked by the former judge, his political enemy, and knocked to the floor twice, according to witness.

The shooting took place in the Meadows hotel. According to an eye witness account, Magee was sitting on a lounge in conversation with W. S. Patterson of Albuquerque when

Lassiter and Judge Leahy entered. Patterson, seeing the newcomers, turned to the editor and said:
"There's your old pal, Leahy; you'd better watch out."
Magee smiled and appeared to take the warning as a joke.

Leahy and Lassiter passed by Magee and the former turned and, without the editor's having a chance to defend himself, struck Magee a heavy blow with his fist on the side of the head. A second blow knocked Magee to the floor.

As the editor arose, Leahy attacked Magee, witnesses said, kicking and cursing him.

Lassiter stepped forward to pull Leahy away just as Magee pulled his gun and fired.

Mrs. Patterson, who had watched the affray, ran forward and caught Lassiter as he fell. He died just as a physician arrived a few minutes later.

Judge Leahy, it is understood, was wounded in the arm. As he left the hotel he remarked to companions, "I think my arm is broken; I'd better get out of here."

Determined Fight Waged
T. V. Truder, assistant district attorney, said that a charge of manslaughter would be filed against Magee if the coroner's jury returned a verdict against him.

Magee's 18 year old daughter Gertrude witnessed the fight and fainted. She is under a physician's care.

"My heart is broken, but my conscience is clear," Magee said after the shooting.

"I am too distracted over the unfortunate circumstances of Lassiter getting in the way at that moment to feel like attempting to make any statement. A half dozen reputable and responsible people saw the entire
