

# Pirates Take Commanding Position In National League

## ODDS OFFERED ON PITTSBURGH

### Record Crowd for Short Series Attend

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)  
**POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, Aug. 24.**—Under a heavy bombardment, the New York Giants collapsed here this afternoon and the Pittsburgh Pirates won the final game of the series by a score of 9 to 2.

The victory of the Pirates increased their lead to six full games in the National League pennant race and in the minds of smart baseball men, practically cinched the championship.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 24.**—Three victories in the four games played in a crucial series against the New York Giants have put the Pittsburgh Pirates in such a commanding position that they are now heavy odds-on favorites to win the National League pennant.

With a lead of five full games and only the last lap to cover at coasting speed, the Pirates go into the final game of the five-game, three-day series at the Polo grounds this afternoon.

After pulling a pair of games away from the Giants on Saturday, the Pirates split even in another double bill yesterday but they showed much more class in their one defeat than the Giants did in their victory.

All National League attendance records were broken for a short series by a Saturday crowd of 55,000 and a monster outpouring of 58,000 yesterday. Police officials estimated that at least 15,000 were turned away from the gates on the two days.

In their game stand against the Giants, fighting in the most important series of the season, the Pirates have shown themselves almost without a weakness. With one exception, it is almost a perfect baseball club.

The infield does not seem to know what to do on a drive to the first baseman and smart baseball men, who observed the awkward defense, could not understand why the Giants did not use the weakness more to their own advantage.

## MISS WILLS TAKES TROPHY IN TENNIS

### Defeats English Champion With Ease at Forest Hills

**FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 24.**—Helen Wills, national champion, won permanent possession of the women's national tennis trophy here today when she defeated Kathleen McKane of England 3-6, 6-0, 6-2 in the finals of the tournament.

Starting slowly, just as she has throughout the tournament, the champion dropped the first set, but once she got started the little English girl could not match her pace and the issue never was in doubt.

Miss McKane was nearly exhausted at the end of the second set, which Miss Wills won in love, and after the brief rest her best efforts were more than matched by the power and accuracy of the California girl's drives.

Once she got her strokes working, Miss Wills was as unbeatable as ever. She was getting her first service in with regularity and at a speed which kept her opponent constantly on the defensive.

For the most part, Miss Wills played her usual back court game, driving deeply to the English girl's back hand and giving her few chances to rush the net.

Miss McKane was forced to abandon her usual mid-court game and attempted to meet the champion at the latter's best game, one of exchanging long drives from the base line.

Eight thousand spectators in the towering stands of the West Side Tennis club here cheered the American girl's victory.

Tram cars bearing thousands, automobiles bringing other thousands, and even trucks filled with farmers from outlying fields jammed the streets for the funeral yesterday which was virtually a national day of mourning.

The little fighter whose untimely death at San Francisco July 14 checked him in mid-career, was a national idol—a fact never more clearly demonstrated than in the honors paid him in death.

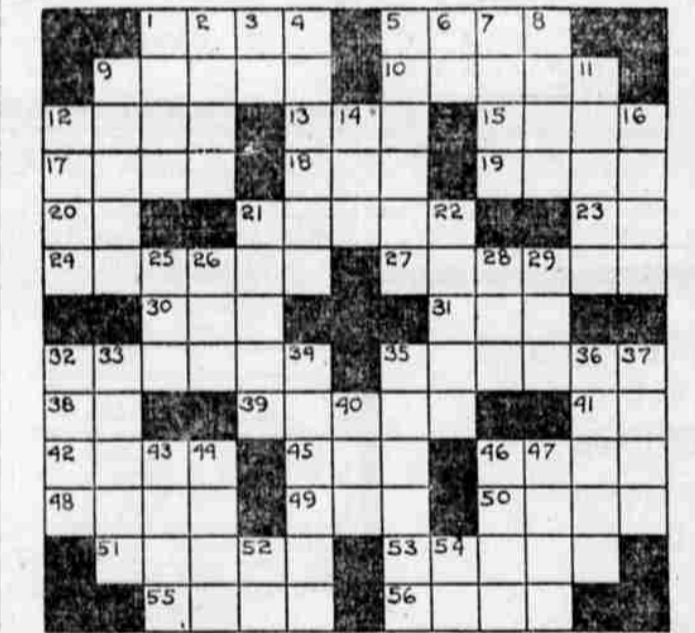

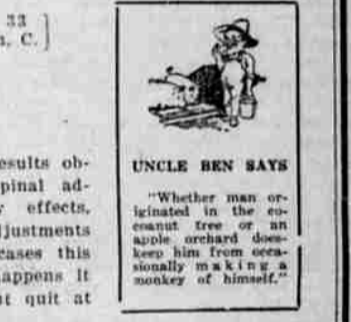
A re-match with Frankie Genaro, who lost a ten-round decision to La Barba here Saturday night, was in the making today. The return bout will probably be held in New York.
