PROFIT TAKING LOWERS PRICES

Sudden Impulse to Sell Is Unexplained

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Stocks encountered heavy profit taking in the late afternoon following further sharp advances in many sections of the list at the start of the new week. Before the reactions set in, numerous highs were attained by various representative issues of both the rail and industrial category.

Nothing has happened in the business world to account for the abrupt selling movement which did not develop until well into the last hour. It simply represented a situation where many stocks had arrived at a point which was no longer attractive to fresh buying, for the moment at least.

Rails which had not participated so extensively in the recent bullish demonstration were accorded support and a few more issues of this class continued to move ahead notwithstanding the general heaviness.

The market closed higher.

BOY IS BEATEN UNTIL HE DIES

Girl Insulted, Is Claim of Other Students

Chicago University Scene of Killing by Undergradu- at Vigilantes

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—Youthful vigilantes, organized for the purpose of making their neighborhood "safe for girls", beat a University of Chicago student to death here Sunday to avenge the honor of one of their sweethearts.

John Klasinn, 21, of Mankato, Kan., a pre-medical student at Chicago university, is the victim. Eight of the vigilantes are under arrest, charged with murder. Four have confessed, police said.

Archie Cahlini, one of those who confessed, told police he was standing, with Miss Inez Parise, on the front porch of her father's home when Klasinn and his friend, James R. Mitcham, son of a wealthy Fort Worth, Tex., oil man, passed.

Noticing Miss Parise and her two younger sisters, who were in the background, Klasinn called out in the free style of the campus:

"I say, that's not fair. Three girls for one man. Let's make it a party." "These are decent girls," retorted Cahlini. "Get out of here."

Klasinn apologized and said he meant no harm.

But the young lover's blood was hot, as he believed his sweetheart and her sister insulted by "morons." Calling several of his friends, Cahlini pursued Klasinn and Mitcham. Klasinn fought off the attack with a razor, but it was wrenched from his hand in the struggle and he went down, his skull crushed.

A coroner's inquest will be held later in the day.

Miss Parise and her sisters will testify, according to the girls, there was nothing offensive about the remarks of the boys.

Late Envoy to Japan To be Buried Friday

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—The body of Edgar A. Bancroft, late ambassador to Japan, was speeding eastward today to its final resting place, following arrival here on the Japanese cruiser Tama.

The body was met with salute guns and was accompanied by navy and army forces to the Ferry building and across the bay, where it was placed on the overland limited for Chicago, where funeral services will be held Thursday. Interment will be Friday at Galesburg, Ill., Bancroft's birthplace.

RADIO DETECTIVES AGAIN ON THE JOB

Unearthly Moan Best Fans Can Draw From Air

In an attempt to locate the origin of a high powered "buzz" that has virtually ruined radio reception in Bend since Saturday evening, two electricians, Gordon V. Hall and Harry Hamilton, today assumed the role of "radio detectives."

At 5 o'clock Saturday evening, according to radio listeners in this city, "an unearthly moan," as it was referred to by one radio fan, broke into the broadcasts. Attempts to tune out this noise have proved of no avail.

Instead of being on the air intermittently, the static wall has continued without interruption since 5 o'clock Saturday night, radio operators report. Many of the radio fans in Bend first believed that the ghostly wail which broke into the broadcasts was the result of faulty sets, but on comparing notes, they found the interference is general.

Using a receiver with a reversible aerial, Hall and Hamilton today were able to orientate, roughly, the origin of the static, and may definitely locate it by night. They move their receiving set from place to place. When the aerial is turned to various angles, the static decreases or increases in volume.

Many local radio operators report that they have been unable to tune in a single station with any success since the wall of static came on the air Saturday night.

That the condition is local is proven by the fact that this interference is not noticeable on sets at a distance from Bend.

EXPECT COOLIDGE BACK IN CAPITAL

May Take Hand In Coal Strike Situation

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., Aug. 24.—President Coolidge may return to Washington next week to take a hand in the coal strike situation.

The President has carried out for a month his policy of non intervention in the anthracite quarrel between miners and operators. He hoped an agreement would be reached.

A strike starting September 1 now seems certain and Coolidge's own New England will be the first section seriously affected by the halting of anthracite production.

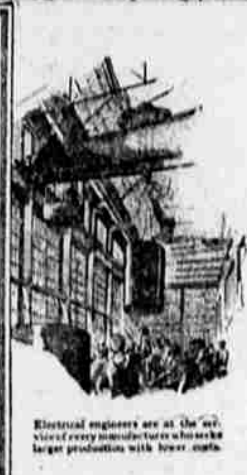
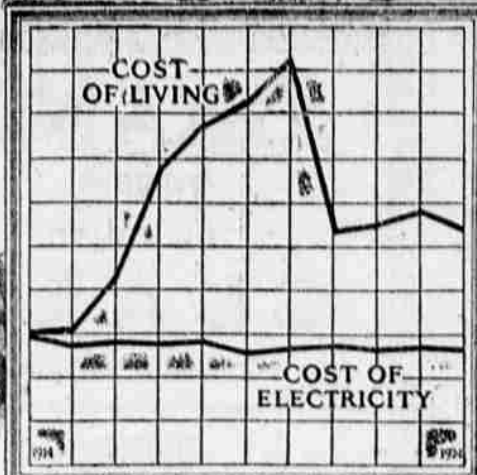
