

Giants Doing Better Without Pirates Than With Them

GAME GAINED FROM RIVALS

New Yorkers Beat Reds, Pittsburgh Humbled

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—The first game of the "second place" battle between the New York Giants and the Cincinnati Reds seemed to indicate to baseball fans that the McGraw men can get along better without the Pirates than with them.

For the Giants, in putting an unusual degree of fighting spirit, humbled the Reds, 7 to 6, while the Pirates were dropping a close one to Boston, 1 to 2.

This puts the Pirates only five games ahead of the Giants, if that means anything. The Giants, in turn, are three and one-half games in front of the Reds and yesterday's smothering only served to establish the existing order of the three teams as the probable order in which they will wind up the season.

The reference to Giant fighting spirit was no mere rhetorical allusion, the customarily docile Ross Young proclaiming to the high heavens that "Pete" Donohue, who was slinging them up for the visitors, was inclined to toss the ball a bit too near the head of the Giants' best right fielder.

Donohue took affront at this suggestion and when the dust had cleared from the resultant melee, both Young and Donohue found themselves two acres removed from the scene of battle.

Since Young only recently has begun to hit after a long layoff, his absence from the lot will not improve the chances of his mates in the remaining games and there is hope in Harlem that the probable enforced vacation will not be for long duration.

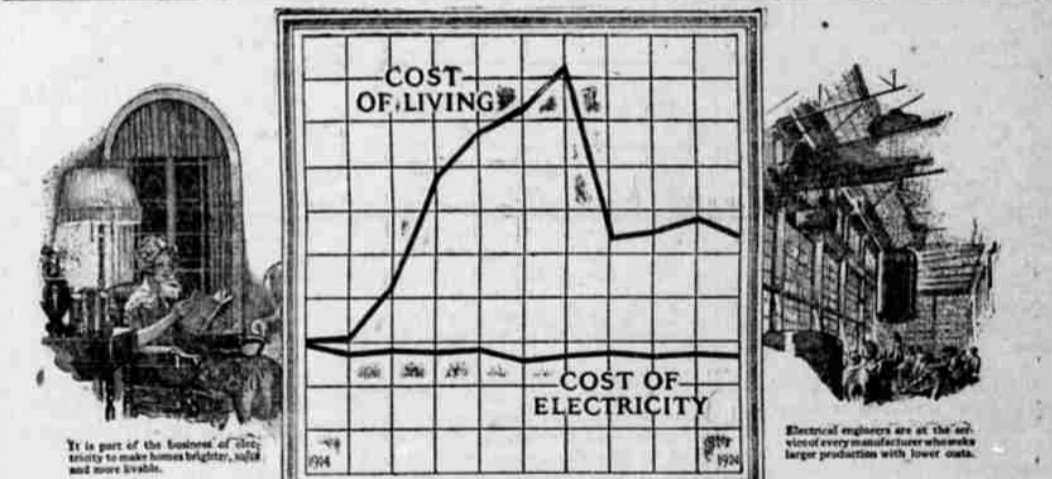
