INJUSTICE IN TAXES THEME OF SPEAKER

Overlapping and Multiple Levies Are Decried

PORTLAND, Aug. 26.—Perfect equality in taxation is a dream that Americans can never hope to realize fully, but there are many glaring injustices in overlapping and multiple taxation that can be adjusted.

This was the opinion of B. H. Vandergrift, Los Angeles, director of research for the California Taxation Improvement association, expressed today in an address before the Western States Taxpayers' association conference here.

"Overlapping of federal and state income, inheritance and estate taxes places a great burden of injustice upon the people," he said. "It causes men to shift their homes from year to year to states where taxes are less confiscatory."

"The flood of tax exempt securities also is increasing the tax burden, resulting in extravagant bond issues and encouraging parasitism."

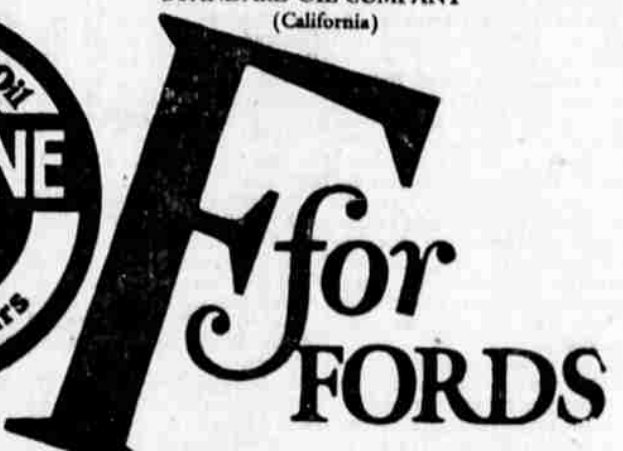
