But It's All Peaceful With Tribes In Dance Contest

GALLUP, N. M., Aug. 26.—America's last frontier town is again in the hands of Indians—but all is peaceful.

Big Indians, little Indians, savage and educated Apaches, Navajos, Pueblos, Utes, Piutes, Hopis and Zunis, thousands of them, are encamped on every vacant spot in this desert town with its picturesque background.

Once they met to take scalps. Today they are here in the most unique all Indian celebration on earth. Fourteen tribes will compete for three days in sports, handicraft and dance.

Mingling with the Indians in their colorful costumes may be seen authors, governors and sight seers in knickers and smart out of door togs.

The ceremonials got under way today with the Tesuque buffalo dance first on the program. This is to be followed with the bear, eagle, war, devil, Comanche, Tablita, Yei-Bah-Chy, spear, scalp, butterfly, fire and other dances.

## Will Quit Connecticut, Movie Interests State
