

MARSH MURDER CLUES ADDED

Clothes of Baby and Man Are Discovered

Find Is Made at Abandoned Amusement Park Near Scene of Killing

MARTINEZ Cal., Aug. 27.—To the tangled clues in the El Cerrito march murder mystery of Mrs. Bessie Loren, Oakland nurse, today was added discovery of baby clothes and clothing belonging to a large man, wrapped in Oakland newspapers of recent dates.

The latest find was at Kosy Cove, an abandoned amusement park near Point Richmond, where a San Francisco newspaper reported uncovered evidence calculated to show that the murder of Mrs. Loren took place.

At this spot was found sand of the same kind as discovered in the newspaper wrapped fragments of the woman's head picked up in the El Cerrito swamp.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—Two men, one a local physician and the other a business man, were to be interviewed by police today at the request of Sheriff R. R. Veale of Contra Costa county in an effort to throw more light on the marsh murder mystery of Mrs. Bessie Loren.

Identification of the victim as Mrs. Loren was made positive when her mother, Mrs. Annie Ferguson, Oakland, was shown articles of clothing, picked up by searchers in near the spot where portions of her dissected head previously were discovered. Two Oakland dentists identified dental work in the upper jaw.

Authorities are prepared to abandon a theory that Mrs. Loren died after an illegal operation, for another supposition that she was murdered.

Mrs. Jane Peabody, beauty specialist, was cleared by police of any connection with the case when she appeared for voluntary questioning.

Mrs. Ferguson revealed that the name of Loren was fictitious and that her daughter's married name was Mrs. Sidney D'Asquith.

An ordinance limiting the number of card rooms and pool halls to one for each 1,000 inhabitants, was read for the first time. This ordinance contains an exception in case there are now a greater number of such places of amusement licensed. No card room or pool hall now operating will be forced out of business.

Under an emergency clause an ordinance giving the city the right to construct or repair sidewalks if the property owners fail to do so after 30 days' notice, was passed. It was indicated that notices would be sent out to a number of property owners where sidewalks are particularly needed, at once so that the city if necessary will be able to make the improvement itself this fall.

A total of \$650 is to be spent on the improvement of the play field at present. Part of this fund is that raised through the play given by the local Kiwanis club. A total of \$150 of the sum is the donation from the Standard Oil Co.

The Harmon play field was awarded to Bend last spring by the Harmon foundation of New York last spring. The playfield is on the west bank of the Deschutes river, near Highland boulevard.

Canton has been occupied by Whampoa cadets, communist sympathizers of the old Sun Yat Sen party, who have arrested over 100 government officials, the state department announced today.

The arrests were made on the contention that the officials were implicated in the recent assassination of Finance Minister Liao Chung Hol. The fighting is understood to be between so called "red" factions and the so called "pinks" with the initial advantage strongly in favor of the "reds."

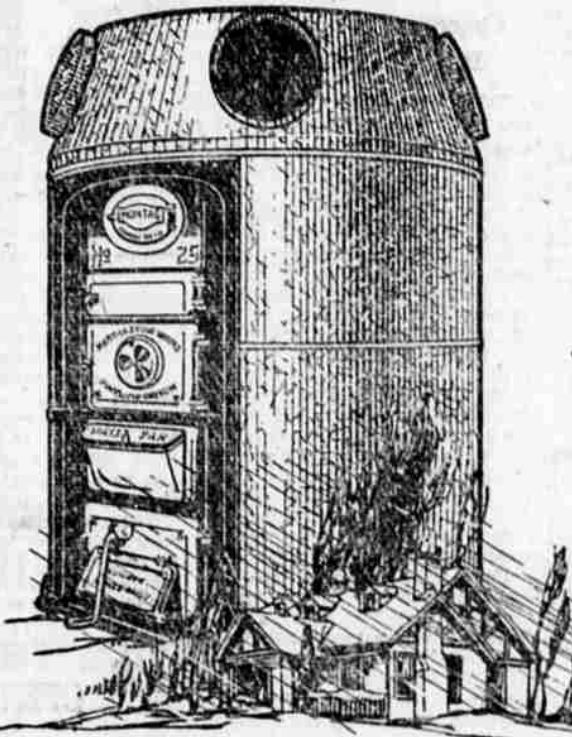
