

October 1st Conceded As Opening Date On Waterfowl

NEW SHIPMENT OF LAWS HERE

Season Comes Too Late Say Nimrods

The big question which faces nimrods of Central Oregon, the date of the opening of the season on waterfowl, has not yet been definitely decided, but the followers of the camp that favor a late season, from October 1 to January 15, won a victory this week when a stack of the game laws of Oregon were sent here in answer to a request that the dispute relative to the open season on ducks and geese be settled.

No letter of explanation accompanied the game laws, but since the season on waterfowl in district No. 2 opens on October 1, according to the printed advice in the books sent here this week, it is presumed that those who swear by the game commission's pink pamphlet of hunting regulations must admit they are wrong. A bunch of these pink pamphlets, which state that the season on waterfowl in this section of Oregon opens September 16, were received here only a few days ago from the commission. As a matter of fact the migratory bird treaty sets the opening of the season definitely for the later date.

Regardless of the correct dates of the opening of the waterfowl season, sportsmen of the Bend country on the whole are of the opinion that the season should open September 15. Ducks, it is held, are much fatter now than they will be later in the season. The argument that an open season September 16, or even now, would prove destructive of the young duck is fallacious, according to sportsmen, who say the young ducks now are virtually as large as the older ones, and cannot be distinguished from the older ones.

Sportsmen of Central Oregon, and nimrods who come to this part of the state when the season opens, will experience the best duck season in years this fall, it is the prediction locally. Not only are there an abundance of ducks in Lake county, where there is plenty of water this fall, but it is reported that there are many waterfowl on the lakes and streams of the Bend country.

DEARTH OF TACKLES WORRIES JIM RINEY

Able Linemen Must be Developed for B. H. S.

"Where, oh where am I going to find a couple of husky, aggressive tackles?"

This is the question which is bothering Coach James C. Riney of the Bend high school football team as the training season approaches.

Riney needs a center pretty badly too, to take the place of the cheerful and dependable Mike Mahoney, but the tackle positions are the big problem which is causing Riney to sing the annual gloom refrain.

The local high school team had only one man who played tackle regularly last year, and that was Hodgson. He will not be available this year. Indications just at present are that Dick Marshall, who played tackle for the last several games, will not be back in school, and there is nobody else in sight with any experience at this, the most difficult job on a football team.

The coach will have more halfbacks, fullbacks, quarterbacks and ends than he will know what to do with, and some of these fellows will have to take a crack at the tackle position or sit on the bench.

Riney is checking over the equipment and getting it ready to issue on the first day of school, for the season is going to come early this fall and any delay will put the local team in a bad hole.

The Redmond game must be played, according to tradition, on Bend day at the county fair, and that is October 2, which will give less than four weeks of training. Also it is rumored that this year the first game with Prineville high will be played during the Crook county fair, which is only a week later.

In order to have his team ready for the Redmond game, Coach Riney is thinking of calling upon the alumni for a pre season game again this year, and the alumni are ready to respond at the first hint of an invitation. In fact, they expect to begin practicing early next week. The alumni are certain to have a heavy and fast team, and the high school boys, smarting under the last defeat administered to them last year, are all the more anxious to get going on the first day of school, September 8.
