IMPROVED TONE FOLLOWS SALES

General List Is Benefited By Corrective Move

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Stocks appeared to have benefitted from Wednesday's selling movement and the general list developed an improved tone after further corrective processes in today's early dealings. Interests working for higher prices were encouraged by the indications of substantial buying power under the market which the reaction brought to light.

Frisco was easily the feature of the railroad group, pushing through par into record territory in anticipation of dividend increases next week. United States Steel continued to give signs of impressive accumulation, a factor which indicated buying of other standard industrials despite disposition displayed by many traders to await the outcome of this afternoon's meeting of the local Federal Reserve bank's directors.

HUCKLEBERRY LURE DRAWING PICKERS

Eastern Slope of Cascades Yields Big Harvest

Picking of huckleberries on the east slopes of the Central Oregon Cascades is reported to be at its peak now, with hundreds of pickers from all parts of the state camped in the vicinity of the patches.

According to campers who returned to Bend the first of the week, the crop of berries is unusually good this year. Warm spring Indians have pitched their camps at several localities on the east slope of the mountains north of Bend and are said to be reaping a harvest, selling their berries to campers who would rather fish than pick huckleberries.

Some of the best patches are in the Mount Jefferson country. These patches can be reached after a short hike from the ends of forest service roads in the Metolius country. Some of the huckleberry pickers are taking pack horses with them.
