

# MINE WORKERS ORDERED OUT

## Strike Called For Midnight Monday

### Union Chief Decides Not to Wait for Conciliation Board Meeting

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—Strike of 155,000 anthracite mine workers has been formally called for midnight Monday, when the present agreement with the operators expires.

The 325 local unions in the anthracite region today will receive the strike order, signed by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, and Saturday it will be read at special meetings of the union locals.

On Monday afternoon the day shift, comprising the bulk of workers, will lay down their tools, and at midnight the strike will be complete when the night shift stops work—unless something now entirely unforeseen causes postponement.

Issuance of the strike call came at an unexpected moment. Lewis decided not to await the decision of the anthracite conciliation board as to whether the 10,000 maintenance men should remain at work in event of the strike.

Chief among the miners' demands were a 10 per cent wage increase and introduction of the checkoff system, under which the employer deducts union dues from the employees' pay envelopes.

The union also had sought a longer term of contract, improved sanitation in the mines and adoption of several safety devices.

A compromise is hoped for today in the consideration of whether the union maintenance men will remain at their posts during the duration of the strike.

Failure to provide for maintenance men would immediately endanger hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of mines.

**PLAN NO INTERVENTION**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The federal government and the American public generally regard the almost inevitable hard coal strike on September 1 with utmost calm.

The government has no intention of intervening, to bring about a settlement and has made no moves in the situation beyond a cursory survey of the methods to be adopted to assure free movement of hard coal substitutes.

The public has not responded to strike threats with "panicky" buying as in the past and as a result prices are firm without skyward boosting. Small increases have been registered in some localities, but not enough to affect the general price levels.

Anthracite stored at the mines constitute about a six weeks' supply. If the strike is over by October 15, there will be no apparent shortage whatever. If it runs beyond that date, substitutes may be drawn on.

### Arrest Man and Girl In Mail Robbery Case

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) LOS ANGELES, Aug. 28.—Two men and a girl were arrested here today on suspicion of robbery and murder in connection with the hold up of a Santa Fe train near Santa Ana Sunday night.

Everett E. Lewis, 26, leader of the trio, was said to have been arrested a year ago for suspected complicity in the \$1,000,000 St. Louis mail robbery, and had been at liberty under \$15,000 bail.

The others arrested were Robert E. Lee, 28, and Pearl Lewis, 26.

Elmer Campbell, mail clerk who was shot when he resisted the hold up, died yesterday in a hospital at Santa Ana.
