DAY IS QUIET ON EXCHANGE

List Turns Dull After Drop Forced

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—It was a quiet day on the stock exchange. Trading was the lightest in a long time and a few of the recent uprushes in special stocks were in evidence. Bears started the session's proceedings with an attack on American Can, General Electric and other industrial

leaders. This drive brought about substantial recessions from their recent highs in stocks against which it was directed.

However, the list turned dull after the initial drop and persistent efforts throughout the remainder of the day failed to force further reaction in the main body of the stocks.

Judgment Allowed Dement Against Garage Building

Judgment in the amount of \$400 was awarded F. Dement against the Whittington-Vandever building in circuit court today, when Judge T. E. J. Duffy ruled on the suit heard Wednesday. The judge held that the liens were filed within 30 days after the building was completed, as is required by law.

Claims of H. J. Bookman and Ralph Hope, which were included in Dement's suit, were allowed, with the exception that offsets were allowed in the case of the Bookman claim. The judge ruled that the liens were prior to the mortgage on the building.

Announcement that poultry culling demonstrations will be held at the F. D. Wester ranch near Terrebonne at 10 o'clock on the morning of September 2 and at the H. A.
