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HIGHEST PEAKS GIVEN LISTING

Loftiest In State Easily Seen From Bend

Seven Out of 25 Bear Living Glaciers—Five In Deschutes Forest

Eight of the highest peaks or mountains in Oregon are visible from Bend or from the immediate vicinity of this city. It is shown by a study of a list of the highest peaks in the state, just compiled by the forest service.

The eight mountains visible from Bend, or from points near this city, are the South, Middle and North Sisters; Mount Jefferson, Mount Hood, Broken Top, Bachelor butte and Diamond peak.

Five of the 25 high mountains in Oregon are in the Deschutes national forest. Although it is generally believed that the Three Sisters are on a line, the list compiled by the forest service shows that only the South and the Middle Sisters are in the Deschutes forest.

Strange as it may seem, 14 of the high peaks in Oregon are in Eastern Oregon, eight within the Whitman national forest, five within the Walla-walla and one in the Malheur forest.
