STOCKS START WEEK SLOWLY

Call Money Tight, Coal Strike Ignored

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Stocks started the new week in a listless, hesitant mood. Call money was relatively tight, due to the demands incident with the close of the month. Another restraining influence was the impending coal strike, which was giving Wall street no worry but caused traders to curtail their activities.

As a result, the general market moved in sluggish fashion all day. Market shrinkage occurred in the volume of dealing whenever prices sold off. On the other hand, transactions picked up appreciably in special stocks when they were accorded bullish attention.

The market closed irregular.

THINK SUBMARINE SUNK FINAL TIME

Italian U-boat, 55 Aboard, Missing for Days

ROME, Aug. 31.—The Italian submarine Sebenico Veniero, with 55 persons aboard, has been missing three days and the navy admitted today that extensive searches for her are proceeding.

The Veniero participated in the recent naval sham warfare and was last reported off Cape Passero. Finding of oil on the waters there gave rise to rumors that she had foundered.

The search is being conducted with dirigibles, airplanes, submarines and submarine chasers, supplied with hydrophonic apparatus.

The Veniero was commanded by Captain Vandone and sailed in perfect trim for her station between the

capture of Passero with orders to await, submerged, for the "enemy" squadron.

The admiralty has established that she was sighted on the 25th near Cape Granitolo.

(Apparently some communication was had subsequently, too, since she is only reported as missing three days.)

Starts Life at Prison For Murdering Mother

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Aug. 31.—The doors of the San Quentin prison today closed behind Dorothy Ellington, 17 year old "jazz girl" of San Francisco who slew her mother and then went out to dance.

Stepping from the machine which carried her to the prison gates, Dorothy turned for one final look at the green world outside, with the wide bay shore at her feet.

Then she walked calmly through the heavy gates and into the cell which will be her home for at least a year. The verdict of manslaughter returned against her carried a sentence of 10 years.
