

HIGHWAY OPENS SCENIC BEAUTY

McKenzie Wins Comment from Journal

Peaks Seem Lifted to An Unbelievable Heights by a Strange Light Refraction

Appreciation of the beauties of nature laid open to the public by the McKenzie-Bend highway is given in an editorial appearing in the last issue of the Oregon Journal commenting on Oregon scenic roads. The Journal says, in part:

"Much is being said about the McKenzie Pass loop drive from Portland since the state highway commission built a road through the lava beds at the top of the Cascade range."

"Much, too, is being said about the Mount Hood loop road. Both are magnificent scenic drives full of the thrill of great experience."

"There is a third. It also begins and ends at Portland. It leads across the Cascade mountains by way of Crater lake, and Crater lake with its more than sapphire blue and its un-plumbed depths is one of the world's wonders."

"The motorist may make choice. If he has a day he may follow the route around Mount Hood. It includes the Columbia River highway to Hood River. If he has two days or more to enjoy the beauty and grandeur about the slopes of Oregon's greatest mountains so much the better."

"Two days are the least time that should be taken in the McKenzie Pass loop trip from Portland. To go either by way of Eugene or The Dalles and to be sure to visit Bend and Redmond en route are attractive trips. Perhaps the route eastward to The Dalles and south to Bend, then to follow the magnificent highway to Sisters and the crest of the ridge about the sunset hour, is best."

"There is some strange refraction of light when the last rays of the sun are clothing the eastern mountain slopes with purple and are suffusing the air with old rose. The peaks

seem to lift to almost unbelievable heights. There are Broken Top and the Bachelor, the Three Sisters, Mount Washington, Three Fingers, Jack, Mount Jefferson and far northward, in the opalescent haze, Mount Hood. It is no workaday highway that one travels but an enchanted path. It is no workaday world that one moves upon but the stronghold of the gigantic and the beautiful. The slumberous trio, the Three Sisters, are full and majestic in their contours. Broken Top and Three Fingers Jack are the wrecks left by prehistoric cataclysms of lofty summits. Mount Jefferson is a slender spire and Mount Washington with rounded breast crowned by mighty monolith is nature's beautiful symbol of motherhood.

"There are lights flickering at the roadside as one travels westward downward, into a dusk which is overriden by high, luminous afterglow. These are the lights of travelers who have stopped to carve spots of comfort out of the night with crackling fires. There are other lights, the steady head lamp gleam of motorists not ready quite to surrender their day's leasehold of the highway."

Lodger Lost No Money Is Declared by Woman

Flat denial of the statement made in Recorder Louis Bennetts court Saturday that W. E. Reed had been "rolled" for \$200 in her rooming house, was made Monday afternoon by Mrs. Marie DuPont, who signed the complaint charging Reed with disorderly conduct.

The statement was made in Reed's behalf, after he had pleaded guilty to the charge, by Attorney Charles W. Erskine, as the story which Reed had told him. Theft of this amount, half of which he said had been returned, was given by Reed as his reason for making a disturbance in the rooming house.

Mrs. DuPont in a written statement declared that when she counted what money Reed had there was \$80 in one pocket and \$20 in another; and when the police arrested him they found \$131 in his possession.

Also the charge made by Reed that an unknown man had made threats against him, mentioning a .44 caliber revolver, was false, according to Mrs. DuPont's statement. She did not give Reed \$100, and that was why he attacked her, it alleges.

SUMMER HOMES WILL BE BUILT

Sites Spoken for at Elk and Odell Lakes

Entire East Side of Diamond Lake Reserved for Campers by Forest Service

Completion of the Natron cutoff railroad across the high summit of the Cascades south and west of Bend will in all probability result in the Odell lake country becoming one of the noted mountain recreation grounds of the Pacific coast, it is the opinion of forest service officials, who are now preparing for an expected influx of tourists and people who plan on building summer homes in the mountain playground.

That the demand for summer homes at the various scenic lakes of the mid-state Cascades has already started was made known today by C. J. Buck, assistant district forester in charge of lands and recreation sites, who has just returned to Bend from a week's trip into the mountains, visiting the various resorts. It is estimated that 22,000 people visited Diamond lake this season, Buck reports.

The forest service has already received between 12 and 15 applications for permits to erect summer homes at Diamond lake, according to Buck. Six summer homes have already been constructed at this lake. Eleven applications have been received for permits to build summer homes at Odell lake. Elk lake is also being considered by a number of city people as a location for summer homes in the Central Oregon Cascades, which next year will be accessible by train as well as by automobile.

Reserve Free Camps
All of the southeast end of Odell lake, which can now be reached from Bend over the Skyline road, will be reserved by the forest service as a free camp ground for campers, Buck reports. This camp ground will soon be made accessible to machines. Sites for summer homes which have been applied for will be surveyed at Odell lake this fall, and it is probable that some of the summer homes will be constructed before the advent of winter. The entire east side of Diamond lake has been reserved for campers.

In his inspection of the forest recreation grounds, Buck found that the lodge pole beetle is doing much damage to the trees on the camp grounds and recreation sites at both Diamond and Elk lakes, and at Diamond lake on a smaller scale. Forest service officials are now attempting to decide on some means of eradicating these destructive beetles in order to preserve the scenic beauty of the mountain lakes. The trees will probably be sprayed before the insects take flight in the early spring. Permits and concessionists have agreed to pay their share of the expense of eradicating the beetles.

Odell lake is considered by the Southern Pacific as one of the scenic localities on its system of lines.

Eighth Graders Given Chance to Take Exams

Examinations for eighth grade pupils in the rural schools who did not pass the tests, or could not take them last May and June will be held in several parts of the county this week, it is announced by J. Alton Thompson, superintendent of schools. These examinations, Thompson announces, will be held in Bend, Redmond, Sisters, Tumalo and Cloverdale. Tests in arithmetic, spelling and history will be given on September 3, and tests in grammar, geography and civics government will be given on September 5.

AMERICAN CAN HEADING DOWN

Professionals Attempt to Force Liquidation

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Prices in the main body of stocks turned generally downward under the leadership of American Can in late trading today, following early reports in a number of special issues. Professional attempts to force liquidation attained some degree of success, following the advance of call money to 4 1/2 per cent compared with the renewal rate of 4 1/2 per cent.

Before the general list developed heavy, brisk buying operations were staged in Pierce Arrow, Packard, Baldwin, American Locomotive, Tobacco Products, American Car and Foundry, United Cigar Stores, and Chicago Pneumatic Tool. However, these demonstrations were checked by the heavy selling which broke out in the last hour, and the markets as a whole closed considerably below the day's best levels.

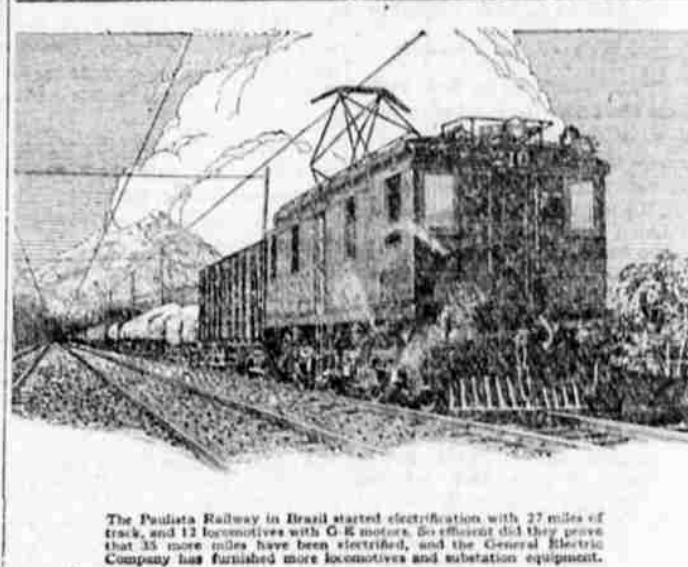
