

HANEY STANDS BY OWN TERMS

Won't Quit Unless Coolidge Retracts

Portland Shippers Support Judgment In Fuss Over Admiral Palmer

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Commissioner Bert E. Haney of the United States shipping board, whose resignation has been demanded by President Coolidge and refused, will stand pat until the president withdraws the charges of broken faith.
Under no circumstances will he accede to the president's demand, he said today, until he is cleared of the stigma of these charges. The president, in asking Haney to get out, said he had violated an understanding entered into at the time Haney was appointed, concerning certain shipping board policies. Haney denied this.
The president let it be known at Swampscott that he believed Haney's refusal to resign was "improper," that Haney would get out as he realized the impropriety of his course. To this Haney replied that he saw no impropriety in defending his reputation and that he would get out only when the president retracted.

PORTLAND, Sept. 2.—Shippers, business men and steamship operators were on record here today supporting the United States shipping board in all its functions and purposes, and in its controversies with Admiral Palmer.

The need for the continuance of the shipping board as long as the government owns commercial ships was stressed yesterday before a visiting committee of the United States Chamber of Commerce.
Frank L. Shull, chairman of the foreign trade committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, declared continuance of the Palmer policies would mean the ruin of the merchant marine. He said the entire northwest was behind Bert E. Haney, who incurred the displeasure of President Coolidge by suggesting that Palmer be asked to resign.

AUTO CONCERNS IN NEW HOMES

L. E. Seeley, R. D. Davis and A. E. Ault Move

Complete Lines and Added Equipment Carried by Firms In Business Here

New homes on Bend's "automobile row"—Greenwood avenue—have been acquired by two local automobile concerns in the past week, and a third concern, the Ault and Armstrong machine shop, has moved into a new location on Bond street, across from the Bend Hardware Co. The two automobile concerns which have new homes on Greenwood avenue are the Bend branch of the Oldsmobile Co. of Oregon and the Seeley garage.
The Seeley garage is now housed in the new structure at the corner of Greenwood avenue and Division street, having been moved from upper Greenwood avenue, where it was housed for three years. The garage now has a total floor space of 55 by 100 feet, divided into a show room, an office, a storage room and machine shop. Each mechanic is to have an individual work bench. "I have the best equipped shop and the best force of mechanics in Central Oregon," L. E. Seeley, owner of the garage, mentioned when discussing his new location.
Seeley's new location faces both Greenwood avenue and Division street. The show room is on Greenwood. A service station, facing Greenwood, is operated in connection with the garage. The new building is faced with pink stone, one of the most popular building stones in this part of the state. Seeley employs four mechanics, a car washer and a service station attendant. Seeley has been in the automobile business since 1907, starting in Chicago.
The Oldsmobile garage, managed by R. D. Davis, is now housed in the building on Oregon street which was formerly occupied by the Seeley garage. The Oldsmobile equipment was moved into this location a week ago. It is announced by Davis that his plant will carry a complete line of Oldsmobile equipment. M. A. Wood recently arrived here from Portland and will be in charge of the shop and the service. A show room is to be operated in connection with the shop. The Oldsmobile garage was formerly housed in the Auto Radiator shop on Greenwood avenue.
The Ault machine shop and garage, formerly housed in the rear of the Silvertown service station, has enlarged quarters in its new location on Bond street. The dimension of the building, which has been purchased by Ault, are 50 by 100 feet. A considerable amount of new equipment has already been installed, and more new machinery will be purchased before the end of the year. General machine work is also done in the shop and garage. The Ault and Armstrong shop was housed in the Silvertown building for 18 months.

WEATHER IS MILD IN SUMMER MONTH

Warmest Day In August Is Only 90 Degrees

August, generally conceded to be Central Oregon's warmest month, was comparatively mild this year, according to figures compiled by the co-operative government weather observer in Bend. The warmest day of the month was on the first, when the temperature climbed to 90 degrees. The mean temperature for August was 60.99 degrees.
Once in August this year the temperature fell to the freezing point, on the 24th. There were 25 clear days, four partly cloudy days and two cloudy days in the past month. The precipitation for the month was .22 of an inch. This fell on August 23. The maximum and minimum temperatures for the month, as compiled by the weather observer, follow:

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been paying income taxes since 1919, when congress inserted a provision specifically taxing their salaries. This provision has been held unconstitutional and President Coolidge, the estates of Presidents Harding and Wilson and federal judges can recover the money they have paid.
Coolidge filed his tax returns last March, a few weeks before the decision was handed down, and his salary apparently made up most of his taxable income. The normal tax and surtax of \$75,000 income amounts to about \$12,000. As far as is known, the president has not made a request for a rebate or even for a treasury regulation specifically exempting his salary in the future under the supreme court ruling.
