

Senators Hold Winning Pace In Series With Philadelphia

SEEM CERTAIN FLAG WINNERS

Eight Straight Are Lost by Athletics

GRIFFITH STADIUM, WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Winning their second game of the abbreviated series, the Washington Senators downed the Athletics today, 5 to 3, and increased their lead to five and a half games in the American league pennant race.

It was the eighth straight defeat for the Athletics and their 13th loss in the last 15 games.

The Senators completely outclassed the Athletics until the seventh inning, when Coveleskie weakened and the Athletics started an attack that drove him from the box in the ninth inning.

The Senators knocked Sam Gray out of the box and got away to a seven run lead in the first four innings.

The Athletics blew up completely early in the game and committed errors at critical times and when they recovered their balance it was too late.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Washington now looks almost as much of a certain pennant winner in the American league as the Pittsburgh Pirates seem sure champions in the National league.

The Pirates are leading the New York Giants by eight games in the National league and the champion Senators ran up their lead to four and one-half games when yesterday they overwhelmed the young Philadelphia Athletics in the first game of the series that may decide the pennant.

The Senators can't lose as much ground as the Pirates, of course, but in the first game of this crucial series the world's champions looked at least three games better than the Athletics from scratch.

It is not safe to hazard a guess on the form in one game, but there was enough superiority shown by the Senators to make it safe to place a prediction that they are about in with the pennant.

The Athletics looked so bad, not so much because they could not hit the old master, Walter Johnson, but because they were uncertain in the field; they couldn't handle the ball in a tight place and they didn't know what to do with it when they did handle it. Their work had all the symptoms of a young team that has gone to pieces, and their defense had none of that sparkling execution that is so characteristic of Bucky Harris veterans.

Letter Writer Is Freed Upon Request of Mellon

Ruth Penitent, But Manager Lets Him Wait

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—When Miller Huggins reaches the same frame of mind as New York ball fans seem to be in, Babe Ruth probably will begin playing baseball again.

The fans indicated in their reception to Ruth when he arrived here yesterday and again when they shouted for him at the ball park during the Yankee-Boston game, that whatever the Babe has done, they are willing to forget it if he will only go out and hit a few home runs.

Huggins announced that he will "talk to Ruth" when he decides the Babe has "learned his lesson" and not before.

Ruth, penitent and far from defiant, plainly indicated his desire to "meet Huggins half way" and apparently has forgotten all about his declarations that "Huggins or I will have to quit."

How long Huggins will keep Ruth out of the game was more or less a question today.

Huggins refused flatly to discuss what it was that led to Ruth's suspension, saying it was "many things" and "not just one act."

Published reports that the Babe's suspension was to be lifted on Saturday were denied by Huggins today.
