

Fewer Changes Than Usual In Gridiron Rules This Year

FLYING TACKLE AGAIN ALLOWED

Little Likelihood of Use, However, Stated

With the football training season less than a week away, followers of the game are facing the prospect of getting used to fewer changes in the rules than in any recent year, a glance at the new rules discloses.

One change which looks important on the face of it, is the omission of the rule against the flying tackle and tackling below the knees.

That would indicate that the old fashioned leap through the air aimed at the runner's shoestrings would come back, but football experts aren't paying much attention to the idea.

Since the flying tackle was abolished back in 1919, cases where any tackler was penalized for using it have been conspicuous for their absence. The flying tackle as a distinct system of tackling taught by coaches, or as a conscious method of bringing down the runner, was not missed, because coaches now realize that it wasn't worth the trouble of teaching it. It was so easily side stepped.

Tackling hasn't been any less vicious and effective during the 15 years that rule has been in effect. In fact, no player ever bothered about keeping one foot on the ground nor about tackling above the knees. He had too many other things to think about.

The only change has been that players didn't spend hours diving at the tackling dummy from a white line 15 feet away. And now the coaches have come to realize that the tackling dummy isn't worth two cents in learning to tackle, although it is a big help in learning to block.

The kickoff goes back to the kicking side's 40 yard line after being made from the 50 yard line last year, and the rule against teeing up for the kickoff is omitted.

When the defensive team is offside it shall be penalized five yards at the offensive team does not receive first down unless the penalty tries the ball beyond the point to be gained for first down. Otherwise the down remains the same, the play in which offside was ruled being not counted.

One of the most important changes is in relating to a blocked punt. If the punt is blocked behind the line of scrimmage by a player of either team, it goes to the team which recovered it, and if the team which kicked the punt recovers it, a down is counted.

Hitherto if the ball touched one of the kicking team's mates, it was a dead ball and went to the opponents at 15 spot where it was illegally touched; but last year the rule was sometimes construed so that this play could be made intentionally, the kicking side recovering the ball, running with it and winning first down even if no gain were made.

The ball is partly blocked by either team and does cross the line of scrimmage, it is played as though it had not been blocked.

Doctor or trainer may come on the field this year to attend an injured player without receiving permission from an official, but he must report to the referee or umpire before attending the player. This rule is designed to obviate useless delay in giving the player necessary attention.

Before the kickoff at the opening of the game, the winner of the toss may elect to kick off or receive and also which goal his team shall defend.

The penalty for clipping has been changed to loss of 25 yards from the spot where the foul occurred.

Bend tennis players will predominate among the entrants in the Central Oregon tournament to be held at Redmond Sunday and Labor day, and the representation from this city will be strong enough in quality to make a serious bid for honors in both singles and doubles. It was indicated today.

Entries were to close Tuesday night, but another day of grace has been given. It was announced today by Dunbar Burdick, tournament secretary, and entries made this evening at The Bulletin office will be received. Entries may also be filed with Burdick at Redmond.

Players from Bend who will play in the tournament include Dr. J. F. Hosh, who won the singles in the previous tournament here July 4 and 5; Don McClintock, Graham McClintock, Gordon McKay, James Cuffillan, Larry Somerville, Kenneth Reilantyne, Douglas Ballantyne and Ralph Curtis. Don McClintock played in the semi finals of the previous tournament, and he and Dr. Hosh won the doubles championship. McClintock will be paired with his brother in the doubles at Redmond, and they are expected to make a strong showing in this event as well as in the singles. McKay also showed up well in the previous contests and is expected to do even better at Redmond.

Prineville will be represented by four or five players in this tournament, and some fast men from Jefferson and possibly from Wasco county are expected to participate.
