

Bobby Jones Retains U. S. Amateur Golf Championship

WORST PUPIL IN FINAL PLAY

Failure at Trap In 29th Beats Gunn

OAKMONT COUNTRY CLUB, Oakmont, Pa., Sept. 5.—Bobby Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, today added his name to the list of champions who have won the amateur golf title two years in succession.

Bobby defeated his pal and fellow townsman, young Wally Gunn, 5 and 7 in the final of the national amateur championship.

Gunn lost the match at the 29th when he put his second into a trap and failed to get out cleanly. Jones was straight up the hill and his second was a nice chip to the green for a sure four. Gunn's fourth left him a long putt, which he failed to sink.

The one-sided defeat of the younger Georgian was no surprise, but it had been expected he would carry the champion farther than he did. Jones, by winning today, adds his name to those of H. J. Witham of Chicago, H. Chandler Egan, also of Chicago, Walter J. Travis and Jerome Travers, as the only men who have won the amateur championship two years in a row.

One of the most sensational shots of the match was out of a trap by Gunn at the 28th. He was 100 feet from the pin, in sand, but he pitched out and into the cup.

The match was played under ideal conditions, brilliant sunshine and not enough breeze to bother the players. A gallery that increased in size until it numbered 6,000 followed the match.

After the match, Gunn said, grinning:

"Well, he always could lick me. I had to do it, after getting him up here," Bobby retorted.

Gunn never would have seen the finals of the tournament at all if Jones had not persuaded his father to let him come.

Harry Power Qualifies For Hole In One Club

Harry J. Power won the honor of making the first "hole in one" ever negotiated on the Bend Golf Club course, so far as has been reported, when his mashie shot from the sixth tee, hit on the edge of the green and trickled into the hole this morning. The distance is 150 yards, with a marked rise from tee to green.

The feat was not accomplished in a regular round of golf, however. Power relates. He and A. A. Symons were practicing, and Power drove two balls from the sixth tee, one landing for the epoch making event.

The only other "hole in one" ever made in Central Oregon so far as is known, was that made by Fred S. Stanley on the first hole at the Deschutes course over a year ago.

ATHLETICS RENEW PENNANT PURSUIT
