COMING UP

After an aeon or so of quiet, more volcanic activity is coming for Central Oregon—to be specific, for Crater Lake—it is predicted by no less an authority than Harold T. Stearns, famed geologist who has been making a hasty tour of this part of the state. Just when this is to occur he does not say; indeed, if he did it might mean little or nothing so far as present terrestrial life is concerned. In the reckonings of the geologist, years become seconds, and "soon" might well be in the year 3000.

But even so the renewal of activity in the water filled crater of ancient Mount Mazama will not be of the terror inspiring sort with which Vesuvius stopped the night life of Pompeii centuries ago; nor, to bring it down to recent times, will it be in any way comparable to the horror which Mount Pele visited upon Martinique. And, to compare it to itself, it will be a very mild and reasonable volcano when one considers the boisterous happenings which startled the Cascades some time since when old Mazama blew his head off and dropped the fragments back into the crater cavity to make islands for tourists to look at.

More islands will appear in the lake, but these will be pushed up from the bottom, says the geologist, and this will be an added tourist attraction. Even the formative process of the new islands will be an aid in drawing the seeker of strange sights, for the rising of the islands like the rising of bubbles on a bowl of batter, will be rapid enough to be seen by the naked eye.

In short, Mount Mazama is to continue, with minor variations, just as we have always known him—a decent, kindly, considerate volcano who, having sown his wild oats, realizes his folly and cares little for the renewal of his erstwhile strenuous life.

That's the kind of volcano we like and respect.

ALL IN READINESS FOR SCHOOL START

Influx of Instructors Marks Vacation's End

Marking the end of the summer vacation, all is in readiness for the start of the school year in Bend Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock. Superintendent G. W. Ager made known today when announcing the manner in which classes will be conducted on the first day of the 1925-26 school year.

The termination of the summer recess is being characterized by the usual influx of teachers from all of the Pacific coast states and from a number of the states east of Oregon. By Sunday evening, or at the latest early Monday morning, it is expected that the 77 instructors comprising the local teaching staff will be in Bend.

Although no school will be held Monday, Labor day, a meeting of the teachers will be held at 10 o'clock Monday morning, and later in the day the instructors will confer with their various principals. 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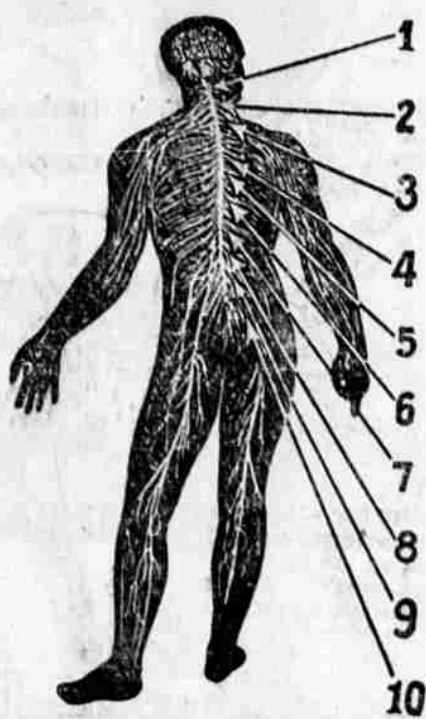
